### WOMEN URGED TO ENLIST FOR CANNERY WORK

The local office of the U. S. employment service is pressed very hard this week to secure hands for cannery work, fruit picking, etc. The opening of the school season has reduced at least fifty per cent the force of available boys and girls.

It is vitally important that the local office secure as soon as possible a list of women and girls who can take on this work. Unless help is secured at once, particularly in the canneries, it will mean a big loss in cannery products. This community so far has responded admirably to the call for women workers in the orchards, and the word has gone out to the other communities that the Rogue River valley has been able to harvest the bulk of its fruit with the help of 150 to 200 women and girls, while in several other localities it has been next to impossible to secure sufficient help either male or female.

It is desired to continue this good record for the balance of the season and get in line for next year's work.

Next year, even more than this, the help of every woman, girl and boy will be needed and if possible the community must get thru the local work without calling on any of the outside communities. Owing to the steady call for men in actual war industries, and the fact that the next draft will undoubtedly hit us strong, the necessity of each and every able-bodied person, male or female, who is left, putting his or her shoulder to the wheel is more apparent than ever before. "Local co-operation" is the slogan for the balance of this season and for the next year's season as well.

### SWIHART ACCUSED OF TAKING AUTO

D. L. Swihart, who until recently was a well known citizen and merchant of Derby, is under arrest at Port Orford, Ore., at the request of the Jackson county authorities on the charge of larceny by bailer. A deputy sheriff will be sent to bring him to Medford to face this charge before Justice Taylor. The warrant was issued Saturday at the request of County Prosecutor Roberts. The Treichler & Pierson automobile concern is the complainant in the case.

Swihart purchased an auto truck on the installment plan from Treichler & Pierson some time ago, and it is alleged that several weeks ago and while he was still behind in his payments, he unlawfully removed the auto out of the county and disappeared with it. Swihart was finally located at Port Orford.

### RED CROSS EXTENDS OPERATIONS IN RUSSIA

TOKIO, Thursday, Sept. 12.—(By the Associated Press.)—The American Red Cross and the Y. M. C. A. are planning greatly to extend their operations in Russia. Forty American and British Y. M. C. A. workers are enroute to Siberia and it was announced today that the Japanese Y. M. C. A. will send a contingent. Mr. Phelps, the new general secretary of the Y. M. C. A. in Russia will start for Vladivostok tomorrow. He says the organization, joining the Red Cross, will follow the armies westward and establish civilian centers in all cities and will aid in the reconstruction of Russia by extending practical help to the people.

### INDICTMENT FOR SANDERS ALLEGES EMBEZZLEMENT

The Josephine county grand jury last week returned an indictment against George E. Sanders, former president of the Rogue River Public Service company, charging him with the embezzlement of \$2281 from the company in 1915. It is claimed that this is but one of a series of transactions of similar character said to total nearly \$100,000.

Sanders, whose present home is Salt Lake City, and who during his several years residence in Grants Pass picked up a wide acquaintance in Medford and the valley, announced through his lawyers after the indictment was brought that he will return to Grants Pass, face the charge and fight it.

Sanders came to Grants Pass in 1909 as a representative of minority stockholders of the Golden Drift Mining company. Through the representation of Sanders and subsequent court action the Chicago-Rogue River company was formed. This company went into bankruptcy and the Rogue River Public Service Corporation was organized and absorbed the Rogue River company. As a result of mismanagement the Rogue River Public Service corporation went into the hands of a receiver in June, 1917, in the United States district court.

The indebtedness of the corporation was upward of a million dollars, while an appraisal of the assets showed less than \$150,000, no income, and the property in bad shape. The property was sold March 30, under court order, but it was so badly involved that it was bid in for the bare amount of the receiver's expenses.

### TO TAKE MEN FOR WAR WORK FROM BUSINESS

The business men of Medford must prepare to have the men now employed in their places of business taken for essential war industries. A community labor board will soon be organized in this city under government auspices to determine just what men will be taken from business concerns and other work classed as non-essential war industries, in the adjustment that will take place here.

The above information was brought back from Portland by Milton S. James, the local federal employment agent, who last week attended the conference of federal employment agents of Oregon with representatives of the department of labor and Wilfred S. Smith, state director of labor. All unskilled workers who are engaged in non-essential business will be transferred, according to Mr. James, who received instructions to comb his territory thoroughly for every available man and to help bring business men generally to realize that the time has come when America must get on a war basis. The business men will be asked to substitute girls and women for men workers in non-essential industries.
