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SPECIAL ELECTION CALLED TO AMEND CITY CHARTER

A special election will be held in Medford on Tuesday, October 15, in order to amend the city charter to conform with the state law which provides that all city elections must be held at the same time as the state and county elections, on November 5th. The city council last night adopted the resolution calling for the special election.

The amendment to the state constitution providing that city, state and county elections be held at the same time was adopted by the people of Oregon in 1917. If this change had not been made the regular city election would have been held as usual next January. Because of this amendment Councilmen Davis, Emmens and Keene who were elected to office in 1916, and whose terms expired last January, have been holding over until the next election. The terms of Mayor Gates and Councilmen Hargrave, Carkin and Gaddis, who were elected in January, 1917, do not expire until next January.

There seems to be a general understanding that Mayor Gates and Councilmen Gaddis, Davis, Hargrave and Carkin at least will run for reelection, and that Messrs. Emmens and Keene are still undecided. Neither the mayor nor any of the councilmen are anxious to continue holding office, but they all feel that the mayor and enough of the councilmen should continue serving the city until the work of completing the new financing plan of the city, which the administration put under way, is finished.

According to the new law governing elections the terms of the mayor and all the councilmen expire next January. This throwing the entire city administration out of office at one time is a bad feature of the new law. But the only manner in which it could be circumvented would be to elect part of the councilmen for terms of four years and the rest for two years, so as to provide for a part of the councilmen always holding over. But this plan is deemed impractical as it is thought it would be impossible to find any men who would consent to be elected to the council for a period of four years.

TIME TO SPRAY FOR APPLE TREE ANTHRACNOSE

In certain parts of Jackson county the fungus disease known as apple tree anthracnose has been developing and spreading to such an extent that an application of bordeaux spray should be made this fall. This disease has not been very prevalent for the past few years until this season. There are few commercial orchards that should be sprayed to control this disease.

The spores of this fungus are thrown off from the old cankers in the fall of the year and find lodging on various parts of the tree. If moisture is present these spores will germinate, enter the tissue of the bark and cause new cankers to be developed during the late winter and spring. Spray to be effective should be applied as early after the first fall rains as possible. Therefore it is necessary to make this application as soon as the fruit is harvested.

Bordeaux mixture is prepared by using 6 pounds of blue stone, six pounds of quick lime to 50 gallons of water. Orchardists expecting to use this spray should place their orders for blue stone with their dealers at an early date, so that a sufficient quantity may be on hand for the spray.

NO MORE GROUND TO BE GIVEN UP

BRITISH HEADQUARTERS/EL FRANCE, Tuesday, Sept. 17, all Montreal (Reuters). The Germans are in their defensive positions. St. Quentin and the fourteen long serve corps has been ordered to give up one foot more of ground captured document signed by Gracovon Mergen, dated September 16, addressed to the fourteen British says: "Hitherto, owing to military reasons, we have allowed the British to occupy desolate enemy country. Now, however, you have taken up strong defensive positions. Not one foot more of ground is to be given up."

After exhorting the men to defend their homes, their families and their fatherland, the document adds: "You are more than a match for the enemy, who only attacks with dash when accompanied by tanks. These we will destroy. I expect every man from general to junior private to do his duty in the imminent decisive battles."
