

### SENTIMENT FOR IRRIGATION BONDS GROWS RAPIDLY

A canvass of the Medford irrigation district made during the past week shows an overwhelming sentiment in favor of the Big Butte creek project.

It is proposed by this project to bring the waters of Big Butte into the district at the 1675 foot level, thus taking under the main canal most of the good land to the east of Medford. West of Bear creek the line will follow the level of the Phoenix lateral.

During the past week the consulting engineer of one of the biggest construction companies of the northwest made a complete study of the whole project, walked over the line of the canal and studied all the data and will stake his professional reputation up the fact that the whole project can be built at under \$75 per acre. A more detailed statement will appear later.

The engineer for the U. S. S. S. has just completed stream flow measurements of Big Butte creek and Rogue river and finds an ample supply of water for the district. Figures bearing out this statement will be made public later.

#### Arguments Used

Those opposed to the bonds have not been able to find any specific criticisms of the proposed project and are therefore trying to defeat the bonds by crying "This is not time to build." All authorities are agreed that prices after the war will not decrease. There is a huge job of reconstruction in Europe to be done. Railroad and road work all over the world will absorb labor and capital. Stocks of clothing, books, foods and in fact all articles, which are now depleted, will have to be manufactured.

Representatives of two large construction companies have told the directors of the M. I. D. that in order to hold their organizations together they would do this work cheaper now than after the war.

To pass the bonds is simply another step towards getting an adequate irrigation system for our lands. The Capital Issues committee will decide whether now is the time to build or not. Do not try to make this important decision for the government. Let Uncle Sam decide if the extra food we can raise is needed to win the war.

#### No Payment for Year

The fact that there is no payment for the water and that the bond interest for one year is provided for makes it possible for anyone to get a bountiful harvest with water before any cash payment is required. By paying \$5.18 a year per acre the interest and principal are paid. There is no other payment required except the maintenance fee of \$1.

During the past ten days petitions have been presented to the board by land owners with land on all sides of the district who wish to get their lands irrigated by this project.

The promise of the board of directors that if the final plans and specifications show that the whole project can not be built and completed for \$75 per acre, not a dollar would be spent on construction until the land owners were given another chance to vote on the matter must remove any lingering doubt about the ultimate cost of irrigation.

Land owners within the district are urged to call at the office in the M. F. and H. building or to telephone 157-R if the plans of the project are not clear to them or if they wish any information.

### WANT WORKMEN TO BUILD CANTONMENTS

The Medford office of the U. S. employment service has been called upon to furnish its quota of workmen and desires as soon as possible to secure as many such as are available in all classes of building tradesmen to help build 4000 more homes at Seattle to be under construction by Dec. 31st, to accommodate the growing population of ship builders and war workers generally.

The war department has also announced plans for building two units of barracks at Camp Lewis, American Lake, near Seattle, capable of quartering 20,000 soldiers.

Those, together with smaller projects now under way assure steady employment for a large number of building tradesmen for an extended period, at least one year.

### WAR MOTHERS PARADE TONIGHT FOR LIBERTY BONDS

Final preparations for the Oregon Mothers' Day parade have been completed by Mrs. Getchell, county chairman and staff of assistants. The procession is scheduled to start promptly at 7:30 this evening from the city park. Mayor Gates has ordered all the whistles to be blown and bell-ringing at 7 o'clock to announce the beginning of the drive for the Fourth Liberty loan. All marching in the parade are urged to be at the places designated for their particular division at 7 o'clock sharp. For the benefit of those who may not have read previous notices—the line of march and points of assemblage are repeated.

The wives, sisters and daughters of men in service are asked to march also. The members of the local Red Cross who are not immediate relatives of men in service will march in the Red Cross section. They are requested to wear their uniforms.

#### Line of March

- Liberty band—Intersection of Main and Ivy streets.
- G. A. R.—Front of Hotel Medford.
- Vested choir—Main street, west of Hotel Medford.
- Red Cross section—Main street, west of Hotel Medford.
- State militia (with flag of the Seventh company)—Main street, north of Ivy.
- Community singers—South Ivy near park.
- Mothers' service flag.
- Mothers, wives, sisters and daughters, Medford section—Front of library.
- Little sisters and little brothers—South of Main on Oakdale.
- Men in service.
- Mothers, out of town section—Front of library.
- Girls Honor Guard—Main street and Oakdale.
- Fing brawlers.
- Special notice to community singers—Please wear white with band of red over right shoulder. No hats. Be at point of assemblage at 7 o'clock sharp.

As the parade will contain nothing on "wheels" automobiles will be in front of park to provide seats of honor for those mothers absolutely unable to march with the others.

On July 15, the Germans made a new drive called by them "the offensive of peace" from Chateau Thierry eastward far into the Champagne sector. No sooner had the news of the attack reached the world than the tidings came that the French, Italian and American lines, subjected to assault, were standing firmly in every vital part of the front and that it was only by the greatest effort that the Germans pounded their way ahead in the region southwest of Rheims and astride the Marne west of Eperhey. The allies had solved the German system of offense and were able to hold their ground.

#### First Allied Offensive

On July 18, Marshal Foch launched an attack which has changed the whole complexion of the situation. From Pontenoy on the Aisne west of Soissons, to Chateau Thierry on the Marne, the German lines were torn to pieces and the Marne salient threatened to collapse. It was only by the most savage fighting that the Germans succeeded in saving their army from disaster and retreated across the Vesle river.

On August 8 the French and British stormed the German lines in Picardy from the Anere river to Moreuil, north of Montdidier and sent the enemy reeling back toward the Somme. The next day the French crushed in the German front south of Montdidier and then linking their lines with those of the British farther north, forced the invaders back.

Less than two weeks later the German lines southwest of Arras were attacked and these gave way and the forces holding them joined their comrades farther south in a retreat which has now virtually reached the German lines as they were on March 21, from Arras to the Chemin Des Dames.

#### Subsequent Operations

The Germans then began a withdrawal from the Flanders salient and today they are nearly back to the lines from which they sallied late in April.

began, struck back at the invaders. American forces had taken part in the final phases of the battle along the Marne and had been instrumental in stopping the Germans at Chateau Thierry. In this battle came the first notable contribution of America to the military fortunes of the allies. Since March, however, there had been a floodtide of khaki-clad men crossing the Atlantic, and during May, June and the first part of July they rapidly moved up to the battle zone.

The sanguinary check of the German offensive east of Montdidier gave the allies hope that the German tide would be safely stemmed, and this feeling was heightened during the succeeding three weeks by a series of local actions along the front from Soissons to Chateau Thierry by which the Germans were driven back steadily from points of tactical value. What was not known by the lay world was that in these very actions, Marshal Foch virtually forced the Germans to attack somewhere on the Marne, where preparations were made for a new phase of the struggle.

#### Ham Tide Stemmed

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of the enemy. His positions along the Hindenburg line east of Arras have been wrested from him, while farther south, near St. Quentin, the British have in recent days, fought their way into the enemy's lines where he had planned to stand on the defensive.

The first American field army has obliterated the St. Mihiel salient and straightened the line east of Verdun and now stands before Metz into which the American shells are falling.

Before the allies there now stands the great lines constructed by the Germans during four years of warfare. These are vast field fortifications which stretch from the North Sea, with few interruptions to the Swiss frontier.

#### Breaking the Barriers

They are constructed with all the science at the command of the German general staff, and present a formidable barrier to further allied attacks. Six months of warfare of motion, however, has taught the allies that a trench is no stronger than the troops that man it. In this fact lies the hope of the entente nations. New methods of attack, the employment of tanks and a higher morale than ever before in the history of the war will be relied upon to force new retreats.

Germany has lost her chance to force peace upon the allies before American armies enter the fight with all their strength. This was her hope in March. Losses of a serious nature were suffered by the allies during the long battle, but they have been more than doubly offset by the flowing American legions. Germany's losses, on the other hand, cannot be made good. Hope blasted, crack divisions broken up and seeming victories turned into defeats have sapped the morale of the German armies which today are on the defensive everywhere.
