POLICE SHOOT AT BOOTLEGGERS' CARS FAILING TO STOP

In their attempts to prevent liquor being smuggled into the state from California the state military police stationed in the Siskiyou are shooting at the tires of all autos which do not heed their command to stop on the highway and submit to a search.

This heroic treatment was begun last Thursday morning and the first victims were the three Portland bootleggers who were given 60-day jail sentences and fines of \$250 on Monday. Their auto, in which was 145 quarts of whisky and 3 dozen quarts of beer, was disabled by shots from the state policemen. The prisoners, Barney Perlman, Morris Minsky and Geo. B. Golde, claim that seven carloads of booze destined for Salem and Portland successfully preceded them over the Pacific highway last Wednesday night. This story is denied by the policemen, who claim that only four cars, including that of the prisoners, passed over the mountain from California that night.

Halted by Police State Policemen Ireland and Triplett were on the lookout for bootleggers all of Wednesday night. About 4 a. m. two cars showed up. The first one stopped on demand, but its occupants were legitimate tourists. The other car speeded away while the first was being searched.

The next car to appear was that of the Portland prisoners. They refused to stop in answer to the officers' demands and speeded ahead. The policemen then emptied their revolvers at the wheels of the disappearing car, disabling one of the wheels. This was near the summit

of the mountain. The car was able to proceed at fast speed down the mountain for a mile or more when the crippled wheel gave out and brought the car to such a sudden stop that Minsky, who was driving, was thrown thru the windshield, losing several teeth and suffering bad face cuts.

Whisky Requisitioned Then after caching their liquor on the mountain side the bootleggers hurried to Ashland to come back in another car. While they were gone J. J. Walker, tunnel guard in the Siskiyou, discovered the disabled auto and the hidden booze, and phoned Chief of Police Thatcher at Ashland. The bootleggers were arrested on their return.

The captured whisky has been requisitioned by the government for use in military hospitals. Further sensational developments in this case are expected within the next few days.
