### CAPTURED HUN GUNS ARRIVE FOR DISPLAY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—Thirty-two German field guns, captured by American soldiers in France have arrived and are being distributed to eastern cities for display during the fourth liberty loan campaign.

They range from three to six inches in caliber and bear names of thousands of American soldiers penciled on the guns, the wheels and carriages. Most of these guns were captured in the offensive between Soissons and Rheims.

### MEDFORD SLOW IN PURCHASE OF LIBERTY BONDS

Hun or home? Which do you prefer? There is but one answer to that query, hence the Liberty loan bond campaign committee is at a loss to understand why the people of the Medford district do not make more haste to subscribe liberally for liberty loan bonds.

Unless the people wake up quickly and begin a rush with their subscriptions it will be out of the question for the Medford district to go over the top with its quota of \$300,000 this week, or come anywhere near it.

Up to today only \$85,000 had been subscribed, which means that only \$10,000 was subscribed yesterday, including one \$2000 subscription from John R. Tomlin. "The subscriptions are coming in very, very slow," said Chairman Kidd today. "The people are not yet awake."

The largest subscription made so far during the campaign is that made directly and indirectly amounting to \$4000, by W. A. Folger, county food administrator. The firm of Gaddis and Dixon have subscribed \$1500. The above mentioned subscriptions are the largest so far. The following have made \$1000 subscriptions: A. E. Bliss, Wm. A.
