

POLIUS DRIVING OVER LABYRINTH OF HUN TRENCHES

WITH THE FRENCH ARMY ON THE CHAMPAGNE FRONT, Thursday, Sept. 26—(By Associated Press) General Gouraud's men were continuing their advance tonight along the front west of the Argonne forest. Greater resistance was being encountered and fresh obstacles were found. Ahead of them is a belt of country seven or eight miles deep over which there is a labyrinth of trenches. Many blockhouses have been built there and the ground seems as difficult of capture as that wrested from the Germans today.

The Germans by their retirement today have gained a little time in which to bring up reserves, while General Gouraud is bringing up his guns. This is an advantage in which it is difficult to find sufficient compensation for the ground and men lost today. The lines they retired to are no stronger than those they abandoned.

Enemy airmen made several spectacular attacks on trench observation balloons today. Only one balloon was destroyed but the observers in three others were forced to descend by parachute.

One German airman attacked three balloons in quick succession, plunging down upon one and firing and then rising to dive at another. One of these burst into flames only an instant before the observer jumped with his parachute. Shrapnel shells then began to burst close about the enemy machine and it turned and sped for the German lines.

CALL REGISTERED MEN FOR EXAMS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—Pro-vest Marshal General Crowder today instructed local draft boards to call draft registrants for physical examination as soon as they have been placed in class one, even though they may have appealed for re-classification. The examination will be postponed only in case there is also pending a claim to deferred classification on industrial grounds.

A registrant no longer has the right of appealing for examination to the medical advisory board after being passed by the examining physician of the local board.

Actual induction into the service of those found physically fit will be in accordance with their numbers as determined by the drawing to be held here.

Notice of Election

Under and pursuant to Chapter 357 of the General Laws of Oregon for 1917, and in accordance with an order of the Board of Directors of the Medford Irrigation District, a corporation duly organized and existing under and pursuant to the above mentioned Statute, duly made and entered on the minutes of said Board, on the 29th day of August, 1918, the Board of Directors of the said Medford Irrigation District, hereby gives notice that an election is hereby called to be held on the 28th day of September, 1918, between the hours of eight o'clock a. m. and five o'clock p. m. of that day, for the purpose of determining whether bonds of the Medford Irrigation District to the amount of \$1,500,000 shall be issued for the purpose of constructing and installing irrigation works for the District, and to provide for payment of first year's interest to accrue on said bonds, a purpose necessary for carrying out the objects for which said District was formed, as well as for carrying out the provisions of said Act.

The bonds to be issued shall be numbered consecutively commencing with Number One and following in numerical order. They shall mature serially in annual amounts so as to be approximately equal principal and interest, beginning five years after the date of issue and continuing up to and including forty years thereafter. Said bonds shall be negotiable in form and payable in Gold Coin of the United States of the present standard of weight and fineness, or in its equivalent. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate not to exceed Six (6) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of January and July of each year, the principal and interest payable at the places to be designated respectively in the bonds and coupons. Said bonds shall be each of the denomination of not less than One Hundred Dollars nor more than One Thousand Dollars, shall be signed by the President and Secretary, the seal of the Board of Directors shall be affixed thereto and each bond shall bear on the back thereof the registration certificate of the County Treasurer who shall sign as County Treasurer and as ex-Officio Treasurer of the District. Coupons for interest shall be attached to each bond and shall be signed with the engraved facsimile signature of the Secretary.

The Board of Directors of the Medford Irrigation District has divided said District into three precincts or divisions known as Precinct No. 1, Precinct No. 2 and Precinct No. 3, which said Precincts are hereby described as follows, to-wit: Precinct No. 1. That portion of the Medford Irrigation District lying East of Bear Creek and North of the North line of Sections 9 and 19, township 38 South, Range 1 West of the Willamette Meridian.

Precinct No. 2. That portion of the Medford Irrigation District lying West of Bear Creek and South of the South line of Sections 25, 26, 27, 28 and 29, Township 37 South, Range 2 West of the Willamette Meridian, and South of the corporate limits of the City of Medford, including that portion of the District lying East of Bear Creek and South of the North line of Sections 9 and 19, Township 38 South, Range 1 West of the Willamette Meridian.

Precinct No. 3. That portion of the Medford Irrigation District lying West of Bear Creek and the corporate limits of the city of Medford, and North of the South line of Sections 25, 26, 27, 28 and 29, Township 37 South, Range 2 West of W. M.

Said election shall be held within and for the above described District, at the polling places which are hereinafter designated, that is to say: Precinct No. 1: Residence on property of W. H. Brown on Eagle Point Road, outside City of Medford, in Section 19, Township 37 South, Range 1 W. M. Precinct No. 2: Residence on property of D. R.
