

CAPTURED HUN HELPS YANKEES TAKE COMRADES

Knowledge of Good Food Causes Surrender of Germans on St. Mihiel Salient—Residents of Towns Carried off by Fleeing Boche After Having Food Supplies Cut Off.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY ON THE METZ FRONT, Sept. 29.—The Germans are tired of fighting. The prisoners captured in the battle of the St. Mihiel salient demonstrate that.

Two Yanks captured two Boches whom they told there was white bread for all prisoners.

"Walt," said the Boches, "and we will find up more prisoners."

After 15 minutes the two returned with 37 other Germans, all glad to be captured.

I saw a doughboy bringing in a Boche, who was carrying the doughboy's pack. An American officer halted him.

Humorous Incidents
"That's a major you've captured," he said.

"Didn't know it," the doughboy replied. "He came easy."

One humorous incident occurred when a regimental commander and staff, after directing their troops to make a stand and fight, tried to make a getaway northward. They walked directly into the Americans coming westward.

The commander's orderly was joyful when captured.

"I'm glad the commander is captured," he said. "He tried to make his getaway, not caring what happened to his troops."

The captives include Austrians, Hungarians, Poles, Rumanians, Alsatians, and perhaps Russians, showing that Germany is forcing subjugated nations to fight for her.

The Alsatians were German prisoners who for months had been forced to work behind the German trenches. They didn't know the American troops were here.

Most of the captured Germans are rejoicing over the fact that they are thru with warfare. Last night six American doughboys guarded 3200 without any disturbance.

Of the enormous quantities of food stuffs captured by the Yanks the only substitutes were for coffee and tobacco.

I interviewed 17 residents of Norroy. The Germans in evacuating the town carried off 300 residents, but 17 hid in cellars until the Americans came.

Madam Millet, an intelligent woman, said: "Three weeks the Germans cut off our bread supply. We lived on nothing but potatoes. They stole my horse and carriage. One officer beat me with his fist because I protested."

"Our priest had 500 francs given him by the American Red Cross for food, but the Germans stole that and led the priest away handcuffed."

Another Norroy refugee said one American boy fighting in Norroy was attacked by an entire squad of Germans. He killed nearly all of them before he was killed himself. Then a German officer whose brother had been killed by the American, mutilated the boy's body horribly with a knife.

I interviewed an American tank sergeant, who, while sitting on top of a tank, singlehandedly captured a battery of German 77's, 22 machine guns and 75 prisoners.

SALES ARRESTED BY EMPLOYER ON CHARGE OF THEFT

Following his discharge in Judge Taylor's court Saturday at his preliminary hearings on a statutory charge and a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor child, and after which hearing County Prosecutor Roberts preferred a charge of perjury against his 15-year-old son, Orley, Roy Sales, the automobile salesman until recently in the employ of the A. W. Walker company, was arrested this morning on the charge of larceny from a building and, when arraigned before Judge Taylor pleaded not guilty. He was ordered held on \$500 bond, and his hearing was set for Tuesday.

The latest charge was preferred by A. W. Walker and accuses Sales of the theft of about \$100 worth of auto accessories from the Walker company salesrooms. The alleged stolen goods were found in the Sales home on Pennsylvania avenue last Friday by Police Chief Timothy after he had been called to the house by Mrs. Sales, who had just returned home from a long absence at Eugene and found another woman's wearing apparel in the house.

Insufficient Evidence
From the time the police chief was called to the house sensational events were on tap. After a consultation between Mrs. Sales, the chief and Prosecutor Roberts and the 15 and 12-year-old sons of Mr. and Mrs. Sales warrants were issued for Sales' arrest on the statutory charge and the delinquency charge.

At the hearing on the statutory charge Sales was discharged because of insufficient evidence. Both Sales and the woman who was claimed to have spent last Saturday night with him at the house denied that she was there, and Sales' sister and her husband, who reside in another part of the city, testified positively that the woman spent the night at their home as their guest. In addition, the older boy's testimony fell down, and the younger boy's testimony was outweighed by the testimony of the others. The explanation of the defense was that the woman was just there for a short social visit after supper.

A still further sensational twist to this sensational case will probably come in the near future, as it was reported today that Prosecutor Roberts will have the case tried before the grand jury next month.

Older Boy Recants

The delinquency charge was also dismissed because of lack of sufficient evidence. The charge was that Sales and the woman while drinking gin in the house put some in lemonade and had the boys drink it. Both Sales and the woman testified that they were not drinking gin, and that what was put in the lemonade was root beer extract. The younger brother testified that they put the gin in the lemonade and had him drink although he did not like it. The older boy, Orley, however went completely back on the story he had told before Prosecutor Roberts, Chief Timothy and Constable Chapman in the prosecutor's office, as they claim, and testified in favor of his father. Immediately following the dismissal of this case Prosecutor Roberts had a warrant served on the boy charging him with perjury. As he is a juvenile the case comes before the juvenile court. The hearing was held this afternoon.

A. W. Walker had been missing money from his cash register for some time, and had a conference with Sales this forenoon on this subject during which he accused Sales of having tapped the till. It is claimed that Sales finally admitted that he

had borrowed sums from the cash register at different times, and agreed to settle with Walker for \$40. Sales was just leaving the Walker salesrooms after this charge when Chief Timothy arrested him on the larceny charge.

BRITISH CAPTURES TOTAL 120,000

LONDON, Sept. 29.—Andrew Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer, speaking today at a meeting opening the autumn war savings campaign, said that since July 12 troops of the British empire had captured 1000 square miles of territory, 250 villages and more than 120,000 German prisoners.

Mr. Bonar Law announced that General Allenby's forces had taken 10,000 additional Turkish prisoners in Palestine.

CHINESE PHEASANT SEASON TO OPEN

The Chinese pheasant season opens tomorrow for Jackson county as well as the quail season, and the sportsmen of the city and valley were busy today oiling up their guns and making preparations for an early start tomorrow morning. The pheasant season lasts 10 days.

Each Chinese pheasant hunter is only allowed by law to shoot the rooster pheasants, and five pheasants is the big limit. State Game Warden Dailey has instructions to search all bags. He has seasoned deputies who will help him out during the remainder of the season.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—The bread line is now one of the familiar sights in Washington. This does not mean a line of people unable to pay for food. It gathers at dinner time at the doors of scores of eating places in all parts of the city.

The restaurant is not popular these days unless it has a line extending out on the sidewalk and perhaps half way down the block. One of the most popular cafeterias in the region of the new ordinance buildings at Sixth and B streets, always has a line. Men and women stand for 20 minutes even before they enter the front doors, then perhaps 15 while the line is being served.

In the new temporary housing quarters which the government is now erecting for war clerks there will be restaurants under government auspices where food will be served at cost.

Reserves Rush In

The headway the Americans have been making is evidently a disagreeable shock to the enemy. During yesterday men belonging to a reserve division were captured after being rushed back at top speed to meet the expected attack. Among the other troops captured yesterday were men from the fifth guards division, which had a taste of American fighting capacity at Belleau wood.

Men of another reserve division rushed from Mulhausen also were taken.

Not only was yesterday's fighting extremely cheering, but there were indications of considerable withdrawals by the enemy. Romanne, where it was expected the Germans would stand, was reported in flames. Later it became known that the enemy had evacuated Viosnes after having blown up the buildings. The bridge across the Meuse at that point has been destroyed.

AMERICANS CROSS CANAL.

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reached Battenelle, having taken Laten wood and Les Rues Vertes, and are in the outskirts of Cambrai, where there has been fighting of the heaviest character. Canadian troops are fighting here and it is possible that by this time they are in the town itself. Cambrai must soon fall and it

is doubtful if there are many Germans there now, for they must realize that they cannot hold on.

Hard fighting seems to have taken place north of the Cambrai-Baronne road. In this district the village of Blebert has been captured by the Canadians.

In the north the British are working through Ploegsteert. It is reported they have reached St. Yves. It is also said that they are in Ostraverne and that they have entered Waterdamehoon.

reject what they propose and resign the leadership of liberal minds to others.

Women Most Loyal
The women of America are too noble and too intelligent and too devoted to be slackers whether we give or withhold this thing that is mere justice; but I know the magic it will work in their thoughts and spirits if you give it to them. I propose it as I would propose to admit soldiers to the suffrage, the men fighting in the field for our liberties and the liberties of the world, were they excluded. The task of the women lies at the very heart of the war, and I know how much stronger that heart will beat if you do this just thing and show our women that you trust them as much as you in fact and of necessity depend upon them.
