IRISH FLOCK TO ARMY TO AVOID CONSCRIPTION BILL

LONDON, England, Oct. 4.—The
Irish conscription question may yet
solve itself.

Suddenly there has sprung up a
marked change in public sentiment,
reports from Ireland state, on the
question of voluntary recruiting.

The government has promised con-
scription will not be enforced if Ire-
land furnishes 50,000 volunteers by
October 15. At first, it is now con-
ceded, the efforts at recruiting met
with little success.

But in the last few weeks, Irishmen
have been joining in increasing
numbers—particularly large they
been entering the Royal Air force.

Some correspondents write from
Ireland that this follows reports
which passed through Ireland that the
air force "has no connection with the
war office whatever."

The Belfast area is in keen com-
petition with Dublin and will proba-
bly find its quota of 8,000 men. Dub-
lin's quota is 11,000. This will not be
obtained at the present rate be-
fore Oct. 15, but the recruiting coun-
cil seems confident that it will be in-
tified in demanding an extension of
the time limit.

Government men say that if Ire-
land should produce the 50,000 vol-
unteers by Oct. 15, despite the an-
tagonism the threat of conscription
as an alternative has aroused, it
would probably be very difficult for
parliament to avoid a reconsideration
of the home rule question.

Secretary for Ireland Shortt is
working on a new home rule bill
which he has promised to have
ready when parliament reconvenes.
In view of the coming election, how-
ever, this bill is considered likely to
go over to the new house, in any
event.

Women in War Work

In answer to the statement that
clothing which is collected by the
American Red Cross society for the
Belgian civilians will ultimately fall
into the hands of the Germans, Her-
bert Hoover has issued the following
statement:

"All clothing collected in America
for Belgium is consigned to the of-
fice of the Commission for Relief in
Belgium, at Rotterdam, placed in
sealed burlap and sent into Belgium
to the Neutral Holland-Spanish com-
mittee, which, working under the pro-
tection of Holland-Spanish ministers
in Brussels controls final distribu-
tion of this clothing to Belgian civil-
ians and accounts to the commission
for every article of clothing sent to
it. Absolutely none of this clothing
falls into German hands." (Signed)
HERBERT HOOVER."

Fears that contraband clothing
may not reach the Belgian sufferers
had been disclosed in the drive now
being conducted in Medford.

More than 4,000 women motor-
drivers have now been enrolled in the
United States in the Women's Motor
Corps of the Red Cross.

ONE WAY YOU CAN HELP.

YOU can help win the war by using only flour made in
the Rogue river valley. There are several mills oper-
ating and all make a good product. If they are not pat-
ronized, they cannot operate and we will again face the
old condition of having to import all our flour and mill-
stuff and export our wheat and pay freight both ways—
on the wheat shipped the mill and on the flour shipped
back.

The farmer faces a difficult problem in marketing his
grain. The local mills help solve the problem. The dairy-
men have trouble in securing mill-ends. If all the wheat
grown here is manufactured into flour, this problem is
solved. Railroad facilities are needed for troop move-
ments and war materials and supplies. The local mills
help conserve transportation by saving car space and fuel.

When you purchase flour made elsewhere, you are
helping clog the railroads with unnecessary traffic and
paying unjustifiable toll in freight rates; you are help-
ing support payrolls in other towns and discouraging
those in your own community; you are increasing the dif-
ficulty of the producer in marketing his product and
raising the cost of the milk you buy by increasing the cost
of feed to the milkman.

The valley is a small one—we are really all one com-
munity and prosper or fail together. What affects one,
affects directly or indirectly, all. If the farm is not pros-
perous, the city cannot be. If the producer does not do
well, the middleman and the consumer suffer. It doesn't
make any difference what part of the valley you are in—
the interest of one section is the interest of all.

For the saving of transportation and the building up
of local industries, the state food administration or the
state council of defense, or whoever it is that has the au-
thority, should forbid during the war, in every locality,
the importation of products that can be made at home.
There is no reason why Portland, or Washington, or
Montana or Minneapolis flour should be imported here
and by other towns and local wheat exported to be re-
imported as flour and feed. There is far more justifica-
tion for such an order than the proposed closing of all es-
tablishments at 6 o'clock in the evening.

For the common good as well as helping win the war
local merchants should refuse to handle any but local pro-
ducts, including flour, when they can be obtained. The
prices are fixed, including the millers' and the retailers'
profit. The latter cannot make any more profit on a sack
of Portland flour than he can on a sack of Medford, Cen-
tral Point, or Eagle Point flour—which really contain
more food ingredients than imported flour made in the
larger mills and costs less.

For the common good as well as helping win the war,
you yourself should insist upon Rogue River valley flour
—every sack of which makes a home market for five bush-
els of wheat and provides mill feed for cattle, thus help-
ing build up our home industries and home payrolls, which
materially aid in creating prosperity.

gathering places if their community

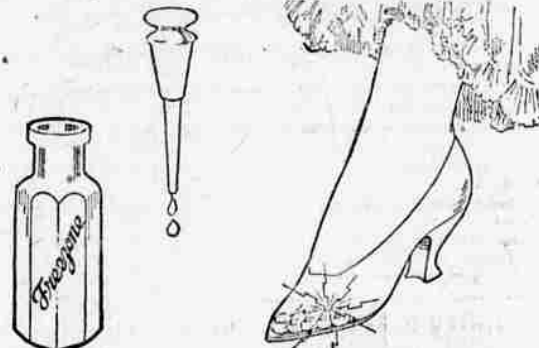
REFUSED A UNIFORM; 20 YEARS IN PRISON
