

BANISHING HUN RUSSIA'S TASK SAYS KERENSKY

Former Premier Confident That Out
of the Chaos, Anarchy and Blood-
shed of the Bolsheviks, a Strong
Central Democratic Government
Will Arise—First Out Germans.

LONDON, Oct. 4.—Unwavering confidence that Russia will set up a central government that will preserve the nation intact and insure future liberty was expressed today by Alexander F. Kerensky.

"The fundamental task in Russia is the clearing out of German domination," he said. "By doing this the Bolshevik government will be dealt with at the same time. A burglar in the house doesn't mean a burglar in possession of the house."

Tasks for Russia
"The second task is the organization of a central government responsible to the will of the majority of Russians. Such a government will be established. At this moment things are shaping rapidly in that direction."

Kerensky is among the leaders of the union for regeneration of Russia, chairmaned by President Tchekovskiy of the pro-ally Archangel "government of the north," which has just abdicated in favor of the central government formed by General Alexieff at Samara.

Kerensky came to London, not because he wanted a safe place, but to urge speedy military help for Russia in a form Russian opinion could accept. He holds Russia is still an ally, fighting Germany.

Recreating a Nation

As he talked to me, Kerensky paced back and forth in his room in the home of a Russian doctor, where he is living. Arms often drawn up like a sprinter's, fists clenched and striking out for emphasis, he told how the Union for the Regeneration of Russia had called a national assembly at Oufa to form a central government composed of members of the old constituent assembly, representatives of the country, cities, and Cossack regions in the larger part of Russia.

"As we talk here a central power is being created," he said.

"Siberia also has a provisional government and duma, and has thrown out all the Bolshevik elements."

I asked his opinion of the present intervention.

Not Intervention But Aid

"It isn't strictly intervention at all, but military aid for the forces in Russia fighting Germany, just as Americans fight in France and French in the Balkans," he said.

"It is simply the necessary co-operation of all allies."

"The important thing is that the allied public, particularly America, which is free from time-worn traditions, watch carefully that military help is used solely in the interest of the people."

"I affirm that not all the European allies' representatives in Russia could have quiet conscience declare they have had no relation with monarchist schemers, and that not without reason did Russia insist that America participate in any intervention."

Bolshevik Tyranny

"I am usually called ex-dictator in the American press. I urgently protest, because with the utmost energy during eight months of revolution I fought all attempts to thwart the people's will by proclaiming as dictator any individual or any class."

"Bolshevik tyranny is at the moment agonizing. This chaos and terrorism is only one manifestation of the fight between the Russian people and Germany. The Bolshevik leaders are leaving to Russia as a heritage the cursed idea that right submits always to might—that only cowards and humbugs can bow to the will of

the people and representative governmental institutions.

"That is also the exact idea of the monarchists, who complicate the fight of the Russian people against Germany and against the Bolsheviks. However, these conspiracies by adherents of cardom and intrigues in certain European allied circles do not alarm me as to the future liberties of Russia."

Predicts State Control

"I know these criminal schemes will fail, because, first, I know the unshakable Russian will to be free; second, watching the world war for four years, I see the tendency toward freedom developing and spreading."

"Even revolutionary tendencies appear."

"Profound upheaval of the foundations of the world's social economic system, the ever-increasing role of organized labor in war processes, inevitable state control of all sides of the economic structure, will unavoidably shape the life of all nations into new forms, far removed from czarism."

"Under the new order, even the old state systems of western Europe will become history."

"Pacifism seems to me, at present, an unadvisable short-sightedness in democratic circles. Only real conservatives ought to follow Lord Lansdowne's example and insist on immediate artificial cessation of the war—of this revolutionary process of deepest world-wide significance."

"Under terrible suffering and in floods of blood a new world is being created—but it will be created."

GAS ATTACKS ON MEUSE RIVER LINE

**WITH THE AMERICAN FORCES
NORTHWEST OF VERDUN, Thursday, Oct. 3.—(S. P. M. By the Associated Press.)**—A successful gas attack was made by the Americans on this front yesterday at Villers, on the Meuse above Dannevois. The German artillery fire was spasmodic during the day. Many gas shells were thrown in by the enemy guns upon the American rear area, notably Septsarges wood, Chantreaux, the Montville road, Dannevois, Sachet wood, Esnos, Forges wood and Jure woods.

The American engineers have removed more than 100 buried German mines from the ground evacuated by the enemy.
