The Medford district alone has shipped 500 car lots of pears, mostly to New York and some middle western points. Prices ranged from \$4.50 per box, car lots, for choice Bosc for the Christmas trade, down to \$1.25 per box for a short season only when the market seemed to break. The bulk of the Bartlett crop went for better than \$2.00 per box. The apple crop is slightly under the normal, following last year's heavy yield. The peach crop was rather light, but the district as a whole has had a prosperous and successful year."

### SUIT OF CLOTHES COSTS \$300 IN AUSTRIAN CAPITOL

PARIS, Oct. 8.—In Austria it is "hell without hope." That is the way internal conditions in the Hun-occupied empire are described by the Vienna Arbeiter Zeitung.

This Austrian newspaper is the only one coming across the border into Switzerland, then into France, that has the nerve to tell the truth. It is forbidden circulation in Germany.

In Vienna a respectable suit of clothes costs 2000 kronas, now, owing to the low exchange of Austrian money, equivalent to about \$200. A pair of boots costs 600 kronas, or about \$90.

A cake of soap cannot be had for less than 30 kronas, or about \$4.50.

It costs 10 kronas, or about \$1.50, for a bar of chocolate.

A bread card entitles the holder to 600 grammes (1 1/3 pounds) of "near bread" a week.

Nearly all the shops in Vienna are closed, the paper says. Bakers' wagons are each escorted by six mounted gendarmes to prevent raids upon them.

"Everywhere is ruin, desolation, starvation," says the Arbeiter Zeitung. "The people of Austria are tired out and do not believe any longer in victory."

### Americans Advance

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY NORTHWEST OF VERDUN, Oct. 8.—(No. By the Associated Press.)—The American troops continued their advance east of the Argonne until late Monday night. After the capture of Chatel-Chéhery they gained further ground.

The advance was aided somewhat by the use of smoke bombs and a heavy fog. A platoon of mine-sweepers was captured. During the night sniping was active. There was intermittent artillery firing once and a half miles behind the enemy lines.

### PERMIT SALE OF TIMBER IN SOUTHERN OREGON

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—The Southern Oregon company, recently restrained from disposing of timber from land claimed by the government until congress enacts legislation providing for its disposal, was permitted by the supreme court today to make sales to meet the pressing demand of lumber for manufacture of airplanes. The court acted on the government's motion.

### EX-SENATOR TURNER ON JOINT COMMISSION

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—George Turner of Spokane, former senator from Washington has been appointed counsel for the United States to the International (U. S.-Canada) joint commission.

Mr. Turner, who served on the commission several years ago, succeeds Manton Wymell, who has joined the army in the judge-advocate-general's department.
