ROY WILLETS OF PERSIST SHOT BY GORDON FOR DEER

Roy T. Willets, a well known young man of Persist may lose his right arm as the result of a hunting accident which occurred six miles northeast of the Buzzard mine on Elk creek at 10 a. m. yesterday. He was mistaken for a deer by Henry Gordon of Fort Klamath. The bullet badly shattered the arm, striking three inches below the shoulder blade.

The men had gone out to look for some cattle of Willets' which Gordon was going to purchase, and the latter took a rifle along. They became separated and Gordon seeing an object moving in the brush fired, thinking it was a deer.

The wounded man was attended by Dr. E. B. Pickett, assisted by Dr. R. W. Poelinitz and was later brought to the Sacred Heart hospital.
