

### MEDFORD SHY \$58,000 OF QUOTA OF LIBERTY BONDS

The committee in charge of the Medford district liberty loan campaign held an important meeting this afternoon to devise a plan or system to bring in the remaining amount of subscriptions necessary for the district to reach its quota. Chairman C. M. Kidd was unable to be present as he was confined to his bed all day. Mr. Kidd is about utterly worn out with hard work and worry in the campaign.

Up to this morning the total sum of subscriptions amounted to \$240,200, to meet the quota of \$298,158. Thursday's subscriptions footed up to \$5200, including one of \$1000, by Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Daniels, and \$1000 subscriptions by William A. Sumner and C. H. Chadwick of Chicago who has property interests in the valley.

Because of tomorrow being a legal holiday when the banks will be closed, the liberty loan headquarters in the Medford National bank building will remain open all day in order to accommodate persons desiring to make subscriptions.

### SAY "NO" TO KAISER MOVEMENT STARTED

WORCESTER, Mass., Oct. 11.—Worcester is to join in the movement to say "no" to the kaiser tomorrow. Under the plans arranged here all the fire alarm bells and whistles will sound "999" at 1 o'clock, which will be the signal for the people to face to the east and shout "no."

### MAYOR TALKS OF CLOSING THEATERS TO AVOID EPIDEMIC

Mayor Gates who with Mrs. Gates and Miss Laura Gates arrived home last night from their auto trip to Camp Lewis, is much exercised over the Spanish influenza epidemic situation over the country, and this morning at once began inquiries to learn if there were any cases here.

He made it plain that if the dread disease appeared in Medford he favored taking drastic steps immediately to prevent the spread through the city, and planned to hold a conference on the matter with Dr. E. B. Piekol, the city health officer. Should the disease appear here Mayor Gates favors following the example set by Eugene, Roseburg and other places where the theaters and churches have been closed and all public gatherings prohibited.

In an interview this morning Dr. Piekol said that so far as he knew there were no cases of Spanish influenza in the city or vicinity. Rumors of several cases in the city upon investigation proved to be unfounded.

"I strongly favor locking up the barn before the horse is stolen," said Mayor Gates this noon. "The disease is so dreadful. The trouble is that many persons who have an attack of it and apparently recover walk about spreading it. The after-effects are the worst part. A person apparently well will get up and four days later fall dead. Every person should stay in bed at least a week after he thinks he is over it. At Roseburg and Eugene we found everything closed up tight by the authorities."

The best preventative of influenza is to spray nose and throat morning and evening with an atomizer containing disinfectant.

### ROY WILLETS NEAR DEATH FROM WOUND

Roy T. Willets of Persist, the young man who was mistaken for a deer and shot in the right arm and shoulder blade Wednesday is near death's door at the Sacred Heart hospital. His condition is precarious, but the attending physicians announce that should his recovery he will not lose the arm.

The entire shoulder is shattered by the .30-30 caliber rifle bullet which entered his arm three inches below the shoulder blade and went into the shoulder. The bullet never came out. The shoulder was so badly torn that it resembled sausage meat. It developed today that the shot was fired at a distance of only 50 feet from Willets, and the shock of receiving the soft steel encased lead was something tremendous. Willets is a married man with one child.

### SPANISH INFLUENZA IN SOUTH AFRICA

### MUST PLAN WAR ON LARGER SCALE FOR COMING YEAR

LONDON, Oct. 10.—Colonel Winston Spencer Churchill, minister of munitions, speaking at Leeds today, remarked that preparations must be made for continuing the war on a still larger scale and with still larger resources through 1919.

"We are dealing with a crafty enemy who is still in possession of enormous resources," he said. "Even if he evacuates France and Belgium that will not assure the acceptance of our indispensable terms, for he can then stand on his own strongly fortified frontier. We must therefore not slacken our output of munitions, as it will be necessary for France and England to supply a portion of the armament and equipment for the American forces."

"The Americans have made a most generous effort. They are sending men to Europe far in advance of the development of their own great munitions program. We have undertaken to supply many hundreds of guns of different calibers, including some of the most important types, to the American army."

"Therefore our exertions must be continuous if we are to make good our promises to those who are hurrying across the Atlantic to our aid. Without this equipment we cannot have the assistance of those valiant American troops who will be wanted to strike the final blow."

### NURSES ASKED TO SEND IN NAMES TO BE REGISTERED

At the request of the secretary of war and surgeon general of the United States army a nation-wide survey of nursing resources is to be made by the American Red Cross.

While the proposed survey is intended to meet the existing emergency and demands of the immediate future, it will also prove of inestimable value in the event of the war continuing for a period of years and in reconstruction work during and after the war.

All women, married or single, who have had any training along nursing lines, such as practical nurses, trained attendants, midwives, graduates of Red Cross courses, under-graduates, pupil nurses and graduate nurses are urged to send in their names at once to Mrs. Blaine Klum, 328 South Holly street, Medford.

It is the patriotic duty of every nurse, both trained and untrained to assist in carrying out the request of the war department by filling out and signing a questionnaire. This does not constitute enrollment, but merely furnishes information.

### SEATTLE SHIP WORKERS LIBERTY LOAN SLACKERS

SEATTLE, Oct. 11.—Charges that Seattle organized shipyard labor was not buying its share of Liberty bonds was made today by George McGilivray, state executive secretary of the industrial division of the Liberty loan campaign committee.

"There are chalk and pencil messages written all over the shipyards bearing such sentiments as 'we will buy Liberty bonds when the Macy board comes through,'" McGilivray asserted. The Macy board is the name given a federal commission which recently investigated shipyard wage conditions. Its report has not yet been made.
