GERMAN PRESS PREPARING WAY FOR PEACE EFFORT

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 11.—German newspapers received here reveal a number of long articles apparently intended to prepare the public for a further development of the peace movement.

Theodore Wolff's article in the Tagblatt takes the form of an impassioned appeal to President Wilson from some friend familiar with Easton, for example, Henry Morgenthau, former ambassador to Turkey, pointing a picture of Germany misled by the false pan-German prophets but loving peace with its whole soul and, having learned its lesson, now ready for a Wilsonian peace.

Prof. Gravenitz in the Vossische Zeitung reviews the events which gradually alienated the United States from Germany, while President Wilson was trying to bring about peace, his efforts, however, being nullified by the German military party.

The Socialist Vorwaerts prints an article seeking to show that the German people have confidence in President Wilson's ideals and sense of justice.

GERMANY WANTS GUARANTEES ALSO

BASEL, Switzerland, Oct. 10.—"Only military reasons could compel us to accept President Wilson's conditions," says the Cologne Gazette in commenting on the American reply to the German peace offer.

NEW GOVERNOR FOR ALSACE-LORRAINE

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 11.—Karl Hansen, a member of the Reichstag and president of the Center party in the Prussian diet, has been chosen to succeed the governor of Alsace-Lorraine, who is expected to retire momentarily, according to a Strasbourg telegram published in the Dutch newspapers.

"DEMOCRATIZING" GERMANY.

ACCORDING to inspired German dispatches, Germany is being democratized over night. Reforms are promised thick and fast. Everything the people have demanded and have desired for the past 50 years, is apparently to become an actuality.

These mushroom reforms are inspired by two motives—the desire of making a successful peace offensive that will secure Germany immunity for her crimes, through befuddling the allies, and the necessity of satisfying and uniting the German people and averting the revolution that military defeat promises.

"When the devil was sick, the devil a monk would be. When the devil was well, the devil a monk was he." The kaiser is sick from defeat with his crown and dynasty in danger, therefore he turns reformer, like Frederick-William of Prussia, who gave the people democracy to end the revolution of '48 and then annulled his grant when danger was past.

The government of Germany is still autocratic, and any changes made are subject to the will of the kaiser, who can unmake, tomorrow what he makes today. The new ministry is composed of autocrats and their socialistic tools and go-betweens. It has no democratic foundations, is not built from the bottom up but from the top down.

Nothing is further from the kaiser's mind, or from the Junker's mind, than to make Germany democratic—and no effort in the line of democratizing that is forced to secure peace to save the throne is other than camouflage.

The German propaganda, working through the kept German press and the subsidized neutral press is busy to create the impression abroad that democracy is in the saddle and that a liberalized Germany is ready to be admitted into the league of nations—but the German government is without honor and practicing its usual double cross.

As Dr. Wm. Muhlon, former director of Krupp's said in his letter to Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg:

"I have abandoned all hope as regards the present leaders of Germany. Our offer of peace with no indication of our war aims, the unrestricted submarine war, the deportations from Belgium, the systematic destruction in France, the torpedoing of English hospital ships have so discredited the governors of the (German) empire, that I am profoundly convinced that they are forever disqualified for the task of elaborating and concluding a just and sincere international agreement. The triumph of the government's methods—the military and political methods by which it has conducted the war up till now—would mean the defeat of the highest ideas and hopes of humanity."

LIBERTY LOAN HALF SUBSCRIBED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—With 46 and 6-10ths of its quota or \$187,382,260 in the bank, the Twelfth Federal Reserve district was to inaugurate its Liberty loan campaign, Liberty loan headquarters announced here today.

All of the major divisions of the district were well over the 50 per cent mark with the exception of northern and southern California and Nevada. A total of 839,903 subscribers for the district has been tabulated.

Eliminating the five principal cities, the percentage of subscribers averaged over 70 per cent of the number needed, and "speed up" orders were issued to points said to be "lagging."

INFLUENZA RAISES ARMY DEATH RATE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—Influenza and pneumonia in army camps made the death rate among troops at home stations higher during the week ending October 1 than in any other week since the mobilization began.

The surgeon general reported today that the rate increased from 32.4 deaths per thousand for the week ending September 27, to 81.3, an increase of 150 percent. The admission rate for disease practically doubled. During the week ending September 29 before the influenza epidemic began, the death rate was only 4.1 per thousand.

The surgeon general said within a short time the peak of the epidemic should be reached.

Intensive training and other strenuous work at all army camps was ordered discontinued by Acting Secretary Crowell during the epidemic.

FRENCH DEPUTIES APPROVE WILSON

PARIS, Thursday, Oct. 10.—President Wilson's reply to the German peace note was approved today by a vote of the committee on foreign affairs of the chamber of deputies. The resolution also expressed reliance in the government not to accept on behalf of France any armistice which would not provide for armistice and for the guarantees "to which the victorious armies of the entente are entitled."

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—Postmen within a few days will assume the task of delivering telegraphic messages classified as night letters, in cities and towns where postal deliveries are maintained.

Delivery of telegrams after that night letters by telegraph messengers will continue for the present.

The following casualties are reported by the commanding general of the American expeditionary forces: Killed in action, 187; missing in action, 65; wounded severely, 379; died from wounds, 124; died from disease, 58; died from airplane accident, 3; prisoners, 12; wounded slightly, 2. Total, 826.

SHORTAGE OF OIL EXISTS IN COUNTRY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—Declaring that a decided shortage in oil exists and that every effort must be made to conserve the present supply, Marsh Requa, oil administrator, today urged the Senate Finance Committee in considering the war tax bill, to take no action that would in any way obstruct production. At the committee's request he will prepare an amendment.

Little progress was made today by the committee. It accepted the house provisions taxing patent medicines and other medicinal preparations.

SERBIANS CAPTURE OVER 3000 PRISONERS

LONDON, Oct. 11.—Serbian troops after capturing Leskovatz again advanced and on October 8 had reached a line 10 miles to the north of that town, says an official statement issued by the Serbian general staff. More than 3,000 prisoners were taken and five more guns captured.
