Another Jackson county boy has been killed in his country's service in France. In Friday's casualty list the name of Vernon J. Perry of Maxwell, Calif., appeared in the casualty list as among the killed in action. He was 22 years old.

The Danley family formerly lived on a ranch on Evans creek, eight miles from Beale. After a residence there of two years they moved way four years ago to Maxwell, Calif., from where Vernon entered military service. His mother was a widow and he was the youngest of four sons. Neither the branch of service he was in nor details of his death are known here.

BIG JUMP COMES IN LIBERTY BOND LOCAL CAMPAIGN

The total of subscriptions in the Medford district liberty bond campaign took another substantial bound yesterday when \$14,350 was subscribed, including a subscription of \$9,000 by the county court and one of \$2,500 by the Shell Gasoline company of California.

The subscriptions so far made in the campaign now foot up to \$234,550, while the quota is \$298,158. There are only six more days left in which to reach the top as the campaign closes October 19.

Chairman Kidd has recovered from his indisposition of Friday and was on the job again today as cheerful and optimistic as ever. Mr. Kidd takes serious objections to the statement that he was worn out with the hard work and worry of the campaign. The reason for his illness of Friday was an attack of ptomaine poisoning.

"I have never doubted the outcome of this campaign," said Mr. Kidd this noon, "as I have too much faith in the patriotic people of Medford and vicinity."
