1,000 PERISHED IN FOREST FIRES

MOOSE LAKE, Minn., Oct. 16.—The total number of victims of the most fearful forest fire in the history of the northwest may be more than 1,000. Already rescue workers have found at least 800 bodies. With one or two exceptions the fires still burning are exceeding over devastated ruins only. The Minnesota public safety commission today turned over its entire fund amounting to \$284,000 for the relief of the fire sufferers. Tison-
