SHAM DEMOCRACY.

THE sham character of the so-called "democratic" ministry installed as a camouflage by the Kaiser to conduct peace negotiations with the allies is revealed by the publication of a speech that Prince Maximilian of Hesse, the Kaiser's new chancellor, made last December at Baden and an explanatory letter concerning it written Prince Alexander of Hohenlohe last January.

Both statements prove that Prince Max is saturated with the reaction of royalty and a firm believer in the divine mission of the German to conquer and enslave the world and in the divine right of autocracy to rule the "supermen." Democracy is as repugnant to the chancellor as it is to the Kaiser.

Prince Max had the sacrilegious gall to attempt to distort the sermon on the mount into a spiritualization of the German sword. He said:

Not hatred of our foe, but rather love of Germany should be the soldiers' true motive in fighting. The sword alone cannot overcome the moral opposition of our foe. If the world is to be reconciled to the greatness of Germany's power it must be taught to feel that behind our power stands not merely a national but a world conscience. True, the whole history of Germany's feelings of responsibility to humanity shines like a beacon. This is the sign we must inscribe on our standards. In this sign we shall conquer.

In explanation, the prince stated that his applied "Christianity" was really endowing German swords with a German spirit by means of which they can conquer the world. This "spirit" consisted of "the duty of the strong to guard the rights of mankind."

Max's ideas about democracy were explained to Prince Hohenlohe: "My object was to laugh to scorn the democratic war cry of the western powers. I quite decline to accept any such thing as western democracy for Germany and Baden."

As to peace terms, Prince Max stated: "I wish for the greatest possible exploitation of our successes" and labeled the reichstag resolution of July, 1917, wherein peace without annexations or indemnities was demanded, "a disgusting child, born of fear and the Berlin dog days," and demanded the "greatest possible indemnities" and considered Belgium "the only object of compensation which we possess."

With a man of these opinions—and practically all of the German nobility and junker class hold such views, the shallowness of Germany's democratic pretensions is apparent and the necessity of guarantees in dealings with an autocracy is evident. Not until the German army is destroyed, the German sword broken, and the parasite princelings of privilege banished, will there be a chance for democracy in Germany.

THE HOME FRONT.

THE battle front in Europe is not the only American front. There is a home front, and our people at home should be as patriotic as our men in uniform in foreign lands.

Every American soldier who has fallen in France, every American sailor who has died for his country's cause has given his life for his people. Surely we, their people, can lend our money to our nation, their country.

EMPLOYERS MUST CLAIM EXEMPTION FOR "KEY" MEN

To employers of labor in necessary industries.—An industrial advisor in behalf of the department of labor to district board, Division No. 2, I call your particular attention to the fact that it is your duty to claim deferred classification for all men in your employ who are "necessary" or "key" men, especially fitted for the work in which they are engaged or highly specialized experts, assistant, or associates, or sole managers or controlling and directing heads of an industry or managers of a substantial or integral part thereof; and not to make claim for men who are not such. The employer, who, through fear of criticism, fails to make a claim which should be made, is as blame-worthy as the employer who, to prevent inconvenience to himself, makes a claim for deferred classification for a man who is not a "necessary" or "key" man.

It should be borne in mind that industry at home must not be prevented at the expense of failing to raise an army. The army must be raised and industry must be maintained at the highest efficiency.

The method for you to claim deferred classification for men who are in your employ who are necessary men as herein above defined, is for the employer to make an affidavit specifying fully the nature of the employment and the reasons for claiming deferred classification, which affidavit should be forwarded to me, in order that men in your employ may be promptly and properly classified it is imperative that you at once claim deferred classification for all men in your employ who are entitled to the same.

TIME TO SPRAY PEACHES FOR BLIGHT

All peach trees should be sprayed during the next month with Bordeaux mixture, 75 pounds of blue-stone, 5 pounds of lime to 50 gallons of water, to control the fungus disease known as California peach blight. This is a very common disease and may be found in all orchards in southern Oregon. It causes defoliation, scabs on the fruit, gummy and cankers on the trees and limbs, and is considered one of our most serious peach tree diseases. It can not be controlled effectively unless sprayed in the fall of the year before the new spores germinate and enter the tender tissues of the current season's growth. If owners of peach orchards will spray in the fall with Bordeaux and in January or February with lime sulphur the trees will be kept in a good clean condition. (Signed) E. C. CATE, County Agent. CAMP LEWIS, Tacoma, Wash., Oct. 18.—This camp will be placed in a strict quarantine of 5:15 o'clock—reveille—tomorrow morning, as a preventative measure against the epidemic of influenza now in the northwest, it was announced here this morning.

PEACE TALK STARTS BOOM IN STOCKS

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—Notwithstanding official warnings from Washington that the war is not yet over, the boom in peace stocks which began early in the week, today assumed broad proportions. In point of activity and scope the movement rivaled the many war seasons of the Stock Exchange in 1915 and 1918. Sales during the first hour aggregated almost 500,000 shares. Advances in those stocks which it is considered would benefit by a declaration of peace ranged from 2 to 10 points. The war issues were subject to liquidation.
