MAYOR CAUTIONS PUBLIC TO GUARD AGAINST EPIDEMIC

To the People of Medford. There seems to be considerable difference regarding the present epidemic of influenza and I wish to request that there be no parties or social gatherings of any description until the present epidemic subsides.

There should be no social gatherings of any kind or any public entertainments and I would suggest that the women quit making calls at the present time on account of the possibility of going into some home where they may have it, but they cannot be convinced that such is the case. This is no time to nibble over this doctor or that doctor's opinion, but if you feel bad and even think you have a cold or a cramp stay at home, go to bed and allow no callers and isolate yourself from the balance of the family if it is possible to do so.

Children should be kept at home in their own yards as much as possible and not be allowed to run the streets. This is a case of prevention and care should be taken at all times to avoid contact with this disease. Let us hope that there will be no deaths as we had news from this epidemic and that Medford will have not cause for regret by oversteering and trying to make herself believe that there is no cause for worry over this dread disease.

We do not need to be afraid, but let our neighbors have sense and Medford will go through these trying times without any serious trouble.

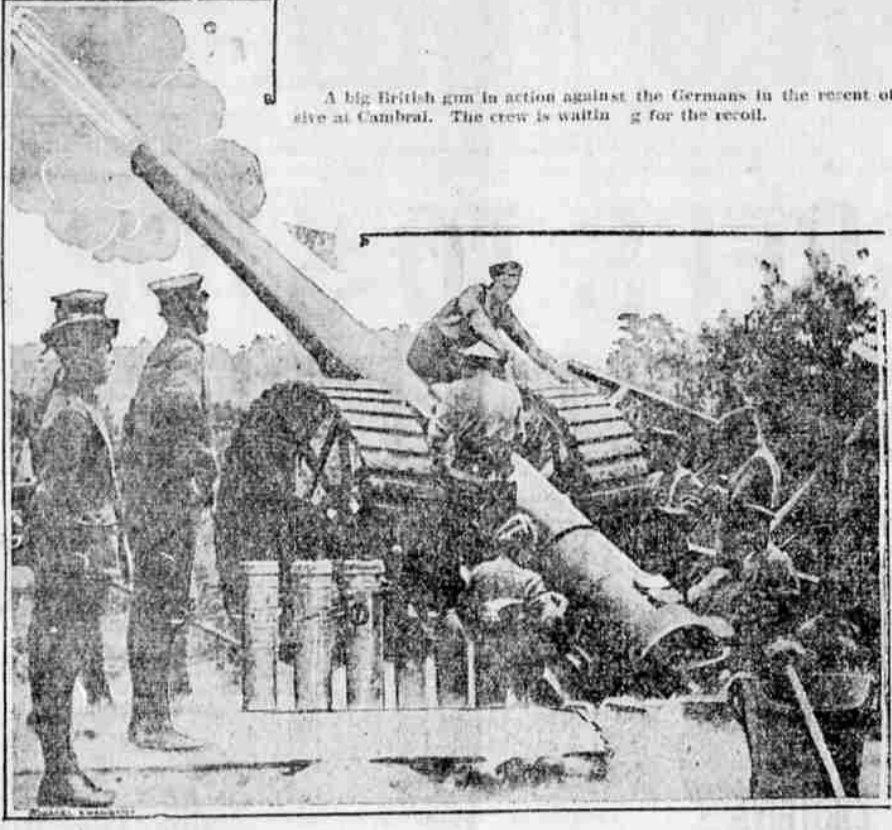

AUTO COLLISION WRECKS CARS AT ASHLAND SUNDAY

An auto collision between a Velox car from Medford containing two men and two women and a Chalmers car owned and driven by Ocho West of Hornbrook, occurred about 9 o'clock Sunday night on West Main street in Ashland. The Medford car crashed head on into Mr. West's car. Both cars were badly wrecked, but no one was seriously hurt so far as can be learned.

There was a rumor around town today that an auto containing a party of Medford men returning from California were in a collision in the Skidways, or else met with some mishap and ran off the road and fell down the mountain side, overturning several times. The rumor had it that several of the party were badly hurt. The collision between the West and Medford cars may have given rise to this rumor. Late Sunday night a Medford man entered a local restaurant with a broken nose and bruises, but refused to state how he obtained his injuries other than that he had been in an auto accident.

A tourist party in the city today said that they had passed the wreckage of two autos which collided Sunday night north of Gold Hill. No one had been injured so far as they could learn.

TRIPLET UNDER ARREST AT SALEM

State Policeman C. C. Triplet who is wanted in Medford to answer to the charge of maintaining a public nuisance by giving away liquor to persons in his room in a Medford rooming house, and who was in Portland when Chief Timothy raided the room last week and arrested State Policeman Smithers, another man and two young women, is in custody at state police headquarters in Portland or Salem, and will be brought to Medford for trial tomorrow or Wednesday by Major Dreck, commander of Gas state police.

Prosecutor Roberts was so advised by Major Dreck on the long-distance phone late Saturday. When Dreck first called up he asked the prosecutor at once to state headquarters whether he believed that this was not possibly an attempt to kidnap the jailer, but was wanted as a witness against Triplet.

RAKOWSKY FAILED TO FIND DESIRED AMOUNT OF ORE

To the Editor: In response to the many inquiries coming to me concerning recent local press reports as to manganese development at Lake Creek I wish to make a statement in the columns of your paper for the information of the Medford public.

These statements were authorized by J. T. Parson in the latter part of July of this year and sent out by the October Press Bulletin of the United States Geological Survey. At that time these statements were descriptive of the situation concerning the manganese development in the Lake Creek vicinity. Since that time Mr. Rakowsky of Joplin, Mo., has done a considerable amount of churning drilling and announced the results of which did not show a sufficient amount of manganese ore to make the project interesting to him. The further development by him therefore was abandoned early in September.

Just what further development work will be undertaken by the Manganese Metal Co. is not known at this time, but I understand that Messrs. DuPont, Langford and Brown of the Manganese Metal Co. have made a recent trip to the property from Tacoma to determine what further work shall be done.

YANK AVIATORS DOWN 17 HUNS

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY (NORTHWEST OF VERDUN, Sunday, Oct. 20.—(By Associated Press.) In the all-American bombing expedition, behind the German lines Friday, American pursuit airplanes brought down 17 German machines. Most of the victories have been confirmed officially. Not one American machine was lost.

On the opening day of the Meuse battle, 17 German machines were downed, but 16 American machines were either lost or damaged the same day.

BELFAST, Oct. 21.—The Irish steamer Dundalk was torpedoed in the Irish sea last week. Of the crew of more than 35, only 13 were rescued.

BRITISH SEA POWER MADE POSSIBLE PRESENT VICTORY

LONDON, Sunday, Oct. 20.—On the occasion of the annual celebration of Nelson Day, the Navy League received today messages from leading public men.

"On the courage, skill and endurance of British seamen depends and always has depended, the issues of the great war," wrote A. J. Balfour, secretary of state for foreign affairs. A message from Sir Douglas Haig, commander in chief of the British army in France, read: "The heart of every one in the British army goes out with mine to all officers and men of the royal navy and mercantile marine. Words fail me in expressing my admiration for our comrades of a sister service. Thanks to their triumphant efforts, we remain mistress of the seas and supplies of all kinds, not merely for our vast empire, but also for our allies, have never for a moment ceased to flow."

Admiral Viscount Jellicoe wrote: "It is sea power alone that has made it possible to bring to and maintain in the main theater of the war on the western front that great United States army which has turned the scale of battle. It is sea power also that has made possible the recent great victories in Palestine and Macedonia."
