

JACKSON COUNTY OVER TOP ALL LIBERTY LOANS

Total of Over Two Million Dollars Subscribed in Four Loans, Notwithstanding Which Bank Deposits Show Increase - Nearly 10,000 Bond Buyers Prove Patriotism.

\$571,704 With \$629,450 subscribed to the Fourth Liberty loan, Jackson county is well over the top. Its quota was \$711,704.

Jackson county's subscription to all liberty loans now totals \$2,959,490, the number of subscribers totaling 9566.

The increased public interest in the liberty loans is shown by the increased subscriptions and number of subscribers. For the first loan, 453 subscribers purchased \$226,100.

Another remarkable feature of the bond campaigns is the fact that although it was predicted that as none of the war expenditures were made in southern Oregon and all of the money was sent out of the country, the banks would be drained of their deposits, the banks have not been materially affected.

MAYOR ORDERS QUARANTINE OF FLU SUFFERERS

Because of the large number of cases of sickness in the city, almost all from influenza or la grippe and pneumonia, whichever the attending physician prefers to call it, and the fact that there were two deaths yesterday at the Sacred Heart hospital of Barnum Apartments residents, more drastic regulations to safeguard the public health and prevent the spread of the epidemic, are being put into effect by Mayor Gates.

Beginning today, by his orders, a blue card such on which is printed the warning words: "Contagious Influenza," will be placed on every house where it is known there is one or more persons ill with influenza or severe la grippe. And every rooming or apartment house or private home where there had been a known case in influenza, will be thoroughly fumigated.

Not Flavored by Doctors. City Health Officer Pickett is not in favor of quarantining homes or fumigating, holding that it is unnecessary.

Dr. Charles T. Sweeney is the only physician who is heartily co-operating with him in steps to prevent the spread of the epidemic, whatever it is, that has caused so much illness in the city.

Since the present epidemic set in the doctors of the city have been rushed night and day taking care of patients and the druggists have been doing a rush business in filling prescriptions and selling various medicines.

Public Nurse Helps. Health Nurse McGrail has been busy day and night looking after cases throughout the city, in a number of instances acting as nurse and physician.

Following the removal of Mr. and Mrs. William Barnum and child and John W. Arthur from the Barnum Apartments to the Sacred Heart hospital, where Mr. McArthur died yesterday, Miss McGrail took hold of the situation in the apartment building, and isolated Miss Pearl Shanks, the maid at the apartments, who is quite ill with the influenza or la grippe. Several other residents of the apartments are ill and she also advised and helped out in their cases.

Fumigate Apartments. While Mayor Gates was hunting around for some one this forenoon to fumigate the Barnum apartments, he learned that Miss McGrail, who has apartments in the building, of her own accord was not about to begin thoroughly fumigating the structure.

All of the sick in the apartments have been isolated and the building fumigated, so that there is no further danger any danger to other tenants or visitors, it was stated this noon. While the death of William Barnum was primarily due to pneumonia, which developed from an attack of influenza, the death of Mr. McArthur is not attributed to influenza, but to bronchitis complications. He had been subject to bronchitis attacks and last week went fishing and got his feet wet which brought on another attack from which he steadily grew worse until his death.

PLANS DEFENSIVE WARFARE.

In Germany must be conquered before the ideal league of nations could be realized, but he continued "whether the next few days or weeks shall call us to fight on, or open the way to peace, there is no doubt we are now equal to the task of either war or peace by carrying out the government's program and definitely breaking away from the old system."

Reforms Discussed. The imperial chancellor then discussed electoral and parliamentary reform. He cited bills before the reichstag, one of which enables members of the house to enter the government without resigning and another proposing a change in the laws regarding the responsibility of the chancellor. He continued: "Deputies will take part in the direction of imperial policy and in the name of the chancellor will be responsible without being ministers. Thus a new way is opened for arriving at responsible conduct of imperial affairs—the parliamentary way."

"We are convinced that it will supply, not only the government, but indirectly parliament, with precious forces from the people which have hitherto not been utilized."

Prince Maximilian said he hoped soon to announce results of preliminary negotiations to obtain a legal extension of the chancellor's responsibility, to be secured by the formation of a state tribunal.

To Keep Alsace-Lorraine. "The new system," he said, "involves, as a natural consequence, a new mode of government in Alsace-Lorraine. The chancellor declared it was the aim of himself and his colleagues to establish the political authority of the German people."

The chancellor said that individual members of the government at first had different standpoints, but now had been brought nearer together.

"The German people have long been in the saddle," he said. "Now it is to ride."

"Our first and last thought," the chancellor continued, "is for the brave men who are defending themselves against superior forces and whom we must defend against unjust charges. No one must think he can attack our army without also attacking the honor of our people."

The lot of our soldiers today is terribly hard. They fight with anxiety for the homeland and with their minds fixed on peace, and they hold their ground. We trust and thank them. We cry to them: The homeland will not abandon you. What you want, what it can give in men, material and food, that you shall have."

The extraordinary war-time measures, the chancellor explained, could not yet be dispensed with but they could be carried out only by the chancellor who would be responsible to the reichstag for their application.

"His majesty's decrees which I announced recently now have been issued," he went on. "They concern not only the censorship, the right of public meetings and restrictions on personal liberty, but have to do with economic, social and political matters."

HAIG DRIVES SALIENT.

British troops again are storming the German defenses west of Maubeuge. The new attack, launched early today between Solesmes and LeCateau, is reported to be making good progress.

Field Marshal Haig is increasing also the menace to Valenciennes, then the western suburbs of which the British are fighting. North of Valenciennes the city has been outflanked by the capture of Broisy. It is not probable the Germans will be able to hold out in Valenciennes much longer and once the Scheldt is crossed here the British will be in position to threaten seriously both Mons and Maubeuge.

Closing in on Tournai. Between LeCateau and Solesmes the British are on the high ground east of the Selle river and it is from this favorable position today's

attack was begun. The German resistance here has been bitter as the line is vital to the security of the German defenses over a wide front to the south and southeast. In southwestern Belgium the British continue to close in on Tournai. North of the town they have forced a crossing of the Scheldt while on the south they have reached the western bank of the river on a four-mile front from Braylles to Bhenarie. South of LeCateau the enemy is resisting stubbornly French attempts to cross the Serre river and take in the rear the German positions east of the Oise. South of the railroad junction of Montcornet the French have made progress between Nizy-le-Comte and LeThour.

Americans Victors. WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY NORTHWEST OF VERDUN, Tuesday, Oct. 22. (By Associated Press).

In the face of stubborn resistance American forces today cleaned up Bois de Foret, west of Briouilles, capturing 75 prisoners. The fight began a week ago and has been one of the most stubborn since the beginning of the Meuse-Arnonne offensive.

The Americans at times fell back under terrific pressure and then rushed forward with all their might. On Monday they reached the line crossing the northern half of the wood and completed their task today. The clearing up of this place endangers the commanding positions of the Germans to the north.
