MAYOR ADVOCATES QUARANTINE UPON HILT FLU VICTIMS

To the People of Medford:

I wish to again issue a special warning against influenza. There were three cases which arrived this morning from Hilt, one is in a very bad condition and the officials at Hilt claim they were ordered here by some Medford doctor but I am unable to find any doctor here who authorized their coming.

The Sacred Heart hospital now has fourteen cases and their nurses are all sick but one and they are unable to handle any more cases. The other cases were taken to the Dow hospital without authority from them and they are unable to handle them. From a phone message from Hilt this morning I find they have one hundred fifteen cases up to 9 o'clock this morning and only one doctor in town.

I have requested that the relatives here of those coming in this morning take care of these people; if not they must be shipped back within twenty-four hours. I have requested the railroad company to not sell tickets in northern California to influenza patients with Medford as their destination. I also wish to issue a warning to the people going to Hilt. I find that last night there were a number of prominent Medford people in Hilt and I am going to request the Hilt authorities to quarantine any Medford people that are in Hilt after today as we do not want them to come back here until after the epidemic is over or any possibility of their contracting the disease.

There seems to be an opinion in Medford that this is not a serious matter, but in the last two days conditions have become worse. I again request that the people of Medford please cooperate with the authorities in our endeavor to stamp out this dreadful disease.

I am publishing an official report from Washington giving all the symptoms and answering all questions regarding this disease, and I request that the people of Medford read this carefully and when you find that there are any of these symptoms to be sure and call a physician and to take all the precautions necessary to avoid the spreading of this disease.

FLU SITUATION IMPROVING BUT CAUTION NEEDED

Physicians report continued improvement in the cases of influenza patients and with proper precaution, the danger should be passed in another week or two. There are 14 cases at the hospital, but six are convalescent, with the balance out of danger. Lack of nurses prevents the acceptance of other cases, as nearly all nurses in the city are ill.

The arrival of three influenza patients from Hilt Tuesday morning resulted in the issuance of a statement by Mayor Gates forbidding the Medford people from visiting Hilt and notifying Hilt authorities that influenza patients would be sent back as lack of facilities prevented proper care here.

Dr. Sweeney was called last night to attend a case of influenza at the Parsons ranch near Hilt. While in Hilt he was informed that a couple of people had made arrangements to come to Medford to the hospital. They said they had made arrangements for a car to meet them at the train. This morning the doctor called the hospital to warn them of what he had heard and was informed that owing to a shortage of help the hospital could not take the cases, so he sent word to the train to that effect. The doctor wishes it understood that he had nothing to do with bringing these cases to Medford.

Owing to the fact that the Sacred Heart hospital is already crowded there is a movement under way to get permission of Dr. Porter to open the Medford Sanitarium under the care of the county nurse for the care of influenza patients.
