NEEDED—A MAN OF ACTION.

THE best reason why Oregon should send Oswald West to the senate in place of Charles L. McNary was given by Robert N. Stanfield during the primary campaign in advertisements for his own candidacy, in which he asked:

Why send McNary, the political pupil and follower of West, when his creator and master could be sent? Oswald West is a man of force, a man of action, a man of convictions who lives up to them.

West made an excellent record as governor, though hampered throughout his term by a hostile legislature which attempted to tie his hands, and the malignantly persecuted by the Oregonian and its partisan echoes. His prison reform attracted national attention, while his administration cost the tax payers hundreds of thousands less than Governor Withycombe's has.

West earned the active enmity of the saloon and vice elements and of big business seeking special privilege. Both the prohibition and suffrage amendments were due largely to his championship. His administration was free from the scandals that have disgraced his predecessor's. He made good as railroad commissioner, and as governor, and will make good as senator.

Senator McNary is also a man of high character and pleasing personality, but amiable lethargy. He lacks the originality and force to push either himself or Oregon to the front in national affairs—and unless we send men of action to Washington, the state will continue to be passed over.

Only a few votes will change the political complexion of the senate and place it under the control of the reactionaries, captained by Lodge, Smoot and Penrose. Senator McNary is progressive in tendencies, but not enough so to keep him from voting with the tory leaders who control the republican party in congress.

If you believe in having aggressive representation for Oregon in the senate and if you believe that in this critical hour the president should be sustained in his war and peace policies—you will vote for Oswald West for senator.

POLITICAL BUNK.

"DO YOU realize that it was democratic votes that defeated the woman suffrage amendment," says an advertisement published by the local republican politicians.

That would be interesting if true. Like most statements of politicians it will not stand analysis—just enough of the truth to base a falsehood upon.

Suffrage was not a partisan issue. It was endorsed by the platforms of all parties. It was championed by the reactionary members of his own party and the opposition party to its support.

Suffrage lacked two votes of the necessary two-thirds majority for passage. The negative votes were cast by the reactionaries of both parties—which included Senators Lodge and Penrose, republican leaders of the senate. Had they voted for the amendment it would have passed.

Why try to flim-flam the people with such bunk?

"IT would be a poor sort of an American who would deny President Wilson grateful praise for the whole-hearted energy and the stern singleness of purpose with which he has thrown himself into the war. He has made himself at once the intellectual leader of the alliance. He has gone straight at the heart of the world evil—the military autocracy of Germany. He has become the least pleasurable of their enemies. He proclaimed them outlaws and demands nothing short of their destruction as punishment for their crimes.

Fallen for Freedom

GERMANS MAKE EVERY EFFORT TO TERRORIZE POLES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—The Germans have made every effort to terrorize the Poles. According to reports from the province of Siedleboin, the rule of the so-called Etappen commandants in that district has been characterized by all sorts of excesses. All men and women capable of doing physical labor have been forcibly removed to Prussia. Compulsions were even sent out to bring in all the boys and girls of whom hard labor is demanded from three to five days of each week.

Aside from the hardships of forced labor, taxes of all descriptions have been levied on the people. In addition to ordinary taxes, a general toll tax of 25 marks per head is required and priests are taxed three marks every time they visit their parishes. The civilian population is obliged to doff its headgear to officers and failure to obey this rule entails a penalty of 10 marks. Even the refugees' houses have been commandeered, and a penalty of 10 marks is required before a house will be allowed to them.

Also, priests who tore down proclamations from their church walls were imprisoned for three weeks or more. The peasants in a certain village raised 1,000 rubles as bail for the release of the priests, but they were held on for 500 more. Then the townspeople were informed that it was not bail but a fine, and the priest still languished in the jail.

How to Make Cider from Waste Apples

For those who have a great many second grade apples and culls on hand, the making of apple syrup is profitable and will help add to the national food reserve. The food administration calls attention to the formula given by J. J. Williams, plant chemist of the University Farm at St. Paul, and urges that this recipe be tried by those who have cull apples and passed on to others.

"Remove the acids from the plain apple cider," says Prof. Williams, "by boiling the cider with precipitated chalk (calcium carbonate, or whiting). This neutralizes the acids of the cider, converting them into insoluble calcium salts, which settle to the bottom and can be removed by decantation.

"Add three-fifths of an ounce of the precipitated chalk (obtainable at any drug store) for each gallon of apple cider, bring to a boil and boil vigorously for five minutes, removing the foam and scum as fast as formed. Pour into containers as tall as available, two quart Mason jars will do, or even big preserving kettles. Let stand quietly for four or five hours, then carefully pour off the clear liquid, throwing away all the sediment at the bottom. Boil the clear liquid rapidly down to a syrup, removing all scum. The syrup should boil at 220 degrees Fahrenheit.

"The syrup is placed in bottles or Mason jars and sterilized by placing the containers in boiling water 15 minutes (starting at lower temperature to prevent breakage). If the whole outfit is then allowed to cool slowly, the little sediment in the syrup will settle to the bottom and leave a
