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RAPID PROGRESS UPON GOLD HILL WATER PROJECT

John Dubois, chief engineer of the Gold Hill irrigation project, states that three miles of the canal, reaching from two and one-half miles above Gold Hill to about opposite Gold Hill have already been completed. The excavation represents about 15,000 yards of material and the work is being done by a force of some 25 men and 60 mules. A concrete dam 140 feet long and with a maximum height of seven feet has been constructed across Rogue river at the head of the canal. The work on this dam had to be done in practically one pouring, necessitating night and day work for 36 hours. This damming of the river presented an engineering problem which was successfully met and at a cost of several hundred dollars below the estimate.

M. Dubois says he hopes to have the system completed by January 1. This will include the construction of the remaining 11 miles of ditch, the building of flumes, headgates and farmers' deliveries.

Indications are that the project will be constructed well within the estimate cost in spite of the increasing price of material and labor.—Gold Hill News.

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WANTS DETRACTORS OF WAR WORKERS SHOT AT SUNRISE

O. C. Boggs has received the following letter from Lieut. Lester O. Toogee, dated "On Active Service." Somewhere in France, Sept. 21. About 10 days ago Lieutenant Toogee was killed by a German sniper on the Verdun front. He will be remembered as having accompanied Hector MacQuarrie, the soldier-author, to Medford in the speaking tour for the Third Liberty Loan last spring. He was well known and popular in the valley and highly esteemed as one of the rising young men of Oregon.

"I am sending you a snapshot which I have just received from home, taken on my trip in Southern Oregon, showing yourself and MacQuarrie. The picture stirs up in my memory the wonderful time which you good people of Medford showed us while we were with you.

"I have been in France over two months and am getting along splendidly. The 81st hasn't been in action yet, but we can expect it any time now.

"The allies are doing wonderful things now, as you know perhaps better than I, as you see a newspaper much more often. I am confident we have the Hun's measure and will certainly put victory across by another summer. The people over here have a fine estimation of the fighting ability of the Yanks and they are counting on us for a lot.

"I want to tell you that the Y. M. C. A. and Red Cross are doing great work over here and I hope you will shoot at sunrise anyone who unfavorably criticizes their work. Those of us in the field under campaign conditions, know of the work they do."

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MEDFORD UPON MAIL AIR ROUTE SYSTEM PLANNED

Since the air service from New York to Washington and Chicago has shown that it is practical there are plans now being discussed for eight air routes across the United States, one of which passes through Medford. A map in the Grand Forks Herald, of Grand Forks, N. D., shows a route starting from New York, running north to Boston, then west through Detroit, Mich., and Fargo, N. D., to Seattle, Wash., known as the Chanute-Bell airway. From Seattle a route runs to Tacoma and south through Portland, Medford, San Francisco to Los Angeles, called the Pacific air
