GATES EXPLAINS WHY CITY SECURED HOSPITAL FLOOR

Mayor Gates, in explanation of the action in fitting up the top floor of the Sacred Heart hospital as a city hospital for influenza patients under charge of the county nurse, states that an emergency exists and that the terms under which the Medford sanitarium was offered were impossible of acceptance.

The first telegram asking its use brought the following reply from Mrs. E. H. Porter:

"Personally do not approve. Only charity hospitals opened to influenza cases here. Building would be unfit for use because of danger of influenza for several months. Doctor returning soon. Letter follows."

Another telegram explaining the emergency, brought the following reply from Dr. Porter:

"Both wires received today on my return. Use of sanitarium granted city on conditions: Mrs. Wagner takes charge. You personally invoice all movable property of every description to city, taking receipts. All my drugs, cotton, gauze, etc., put in storage room. My office, X-ray and storage rooms to be locked. Three cords of wood in basement. Ed White to run boiler. City makes satisfactory terms with Calder regarding his rent six months. City to give me written agreement regarding all damages and expense of disinfection and cleaning on vacating as I direct. Silverware not available. Suggest meals to be procured from hotels."

As the Sacred Heart offered free use of a floor with beds, and it was only necessary to furnish bedding, etc., the city accepted the offer. The hospital has been equipped by the Red Cross and Miss McGill, public health nurse, in charge.

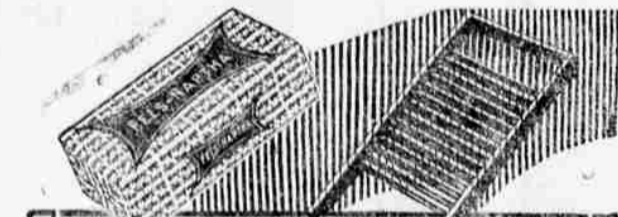
