

MRS. RUSSELL SAGE WIDOW OF GREAT FINANCIER, DEAD

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Mrs. Russell Sage, widow of the financier and one of the richest women in the world, died at her home here early today. Mrs. Sage, who was 90 years old, had been in feeble health for several years, and three or four days ago her condition became serious. Her death was caused by ailments due to advanced age.

Mrs. Sage had been virtually a recluse in her Fifth avenue house for several years. She has been rarely in public and her visitors were limited to close friends and relatives. Margaret Olivia Sage, until she reached middle life had only the meagre income of a school teacher and then in a day she found herself mistress of one of the greatest fortunes in America. Her early days were devoted to scraping together enough money to give herself a fair education, and her last years were spent in developing the science of giving money away. During the last seven years of complete stewardship of the \$70,000,000 left by her husband, Russell Sage, she returned nearly \$30,000,000 to the public by systematic philanthropies.

"My experience has taught me," she had said recently, "that successful people are those who take what comes to hand, and if it be small, wait and work for something better. The root of failure lies often in the thought that you can do but one thing and must do that or nothing."

This practical philosophy developed when she was a girl in Syracuse, N. Y., her birthplace. Her father, Joseph Slocum, was so reduced in circumstances by the panic of 1837 that the daughter, at the age of only nine years was obliged to help in the upkeep of the household. At the age of 16 she started for Mount Holyoke college expecting to work her way for four years by housework, but sickness overtook her on her way and she was compelled to stop at an uncle's house in Troy. Later she was induced to enter Emma Willard's Seminary at Troy, and after a hard battle for self-support she was graduated and became a school teacher. For nearly 20 years afterward she continued her battle, teaching schools in Philadelphia, Syracuse and Troy until, at the age of 41 years, she became the wife of Russell Sage, then a frugal banker at Waterbury, N. Y.

Their home life was simple, despite their great wealth. Mrs. Sage took such a deep interest in her husband's affairs that he turned over to her five years before his death complete control of his business and found that his faith was borne out by her successful operations. But she was proudest of her ability to support herself altogether independent of wealth, and of her housekeeping.

In addition to voting the state and county ticket Tuesday, Medford voters will also be called upon to vote for city officials, and elect a mayor, recorder, treasurer and six councilmen.

There is no contest with the present incumbents for any office, save that of recorder, where H. D. Howard, who was nominated by a petition circulated and filed by Ray Toft, opposes M. L. Alford, the present recorder.

The complete ticket is as follows: For mayor, C. E. Gates; for recorder, M. L. Alford and H. D. Howard; for treasurer, Mary A. Haswell; for councilmen, first ward, J. J. Emmens and E. C. Gaddis; second ward, John H. Carlin and J. M. Keene; third ward, J. W. Dressler and H. P. Harvace.

The voting will be at the same polls and before the same election boards as the general election.

The Saturday's issue of the Mail Tribune mentions a number of republicans who were appointed by President Wilson to do government service but there is not a single one of these appointees who draws a salary with the exception of Clyde E. No one knows what the politics of General Pershing are; all of the rest of the persons named in the editorial "Not a Partisan" are people who are serving without pay. The editor might have added that the local Red Cross workers and the local Liberty loan committees and the local republican attorneys, who have made out the questionnaires for a large number of the soldiers who were drafted, were also appointees of Woodrow Wilson; but it is a significant fact that no appointees have been made within the state of Oregon by the president of republicans to positions that carry with them salaries. The editor has not and cannot point to any local republican that has any position of emolument made by Woodrow Wilson.

The editorial in the Tribune is the best evidence to all of the people of the United States of the thoroughgoing loyalty and patriotism of the big republican statesmen and the great republican industrial leaders for they are all voluntarily in the service of their country without pay; and the positions of emolument have gone to the democrats who are partisan supporters of the president. The editorial is also an excellent evidence to the republicans of Jackson county and the state of Oregon that the president's letter calling for partisanship in this campaign is entirely without warrant and absolutely unjustifiable for these great republicans referred to in the editorial are all working wholeheartedly and patriotically and free of charge for the interests of the American people.

However, two of the greatest republicans, each of whom has been exceedingly desirous of doing something for his country during its great trial, have been by the action of the president kept out of such service. We refer to Theodore Roosevelt and General Leonard Wood, head of the United States army, appointed by Theodore Roosevelt.

CITY ELECTION TO VOTE AT SAME POLLS AS COUNTY

GERMAN ARMY
NOW IN MOST
SERIOUS PLIGHT

LONDON, Nov. 4.—Military authorities, who three weeks ago were skeptical over the return of peace because of the military situation are convinced that the German army is in a serious condition owing to its inability to shorten its line and produce fresh reserves.

It is pointed out that German casualties this year amount to two million and five hundred thousand, of which a million are permanent casualties. Last March Germany had 30 fresh reserve divisions, which meant divisions which had not been in line for a month. Now the German reserve consists of 50 divisions, only seven of which have had as much as a fortnight's rest, and none as much as a month, which is considered the minimum for an efficient force. German divisions now are appearing on the firing line with many hundreds of rifles below the German normal of 6750.

On October 3, regiments in 40 or 50 divisions were reduced from a four company to a three company basis. Many of the youths of the 1920 class which the Germans wished to hold to the spring now are in the field. This is Germany's last man-power hope.

It is calculated that Germany had 18,000 guns on July 15 of which a third has been lost. The number of guns and batteries has been reduced and some batteries have been equipped with third-rate weapons.

**BRITISH CAPTURE
20,000 PRISONERS
ASIAGO PLATEAU**

LONDON, Nov. 4.—More than 20,000 prisoners and several hundred guns have been taken by the 48th British division operating on the Asiago plateau towards the Trentino, the war office announced today.

On the Venetian plains the forces that effected a crossing of the Tagliamento river included the 322nd American regiment.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—It is officially announced that the Tenth Italian army with which the British contingents have been fighting have captured more than 16,000 prisoners east of the Piave.

ROME, Nov. 4.—The entire Italian front continues to move forward, the war office announced today.

On the mountain front from Tonale to Lake Garda, west of Trent, the Italian armies are progressing rapidly and are advancing on Riva and other points west of the Adige.

**AMERICANS BRING DOWN
124 HUN AIRPLANES**

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY ON THE SEDAN FRONT, Nov. 4.—(By the Associated Press.)—Since the resumption of the American offensive on this front the Americans have brought down in three days 124 German airplanes. The Americans have lost 29 machines.
