

LOWE, REPUBLICAN, SEEKING OFFICE AS A 'DEMOCRAT'

Considerable excitement has been caused in local democratic ranks by the discovery that D. M. Lowe, of Ashland, democratic nominee for representative, is a republican, although seeking office as a democrat. He registered in March, 1916 as a republican and has not changed his registration since. His name was written in at the primaries—the democrats having no candidate.

Lowe's candidacy is said to represent a political fight among the republicans, some of whom seek Ben Sheldon's scalp and some Westlund's. At any rate, there will be a three corner scrap in which the democrats are being used to promote republican "harmony."

ASHLAND, Nov. 4.—Mr. Lowe stated at Ashland this morning that he was registered in the republican primary, that he was not up to beat Ben Sheldon and the reason he did not run in the republican primary was that he would have been compelled to support Sheldon and Westlund. As he could not have appeared with good grace as a candidate in the republican primary and therefore had his name written in in the democratic primary. He has made the statement repeatedly that Thomas was supporting him, that he got him to enter the race, that Thomas wanted somebody he could work with in the legislature.

PIERCE'S SALARY GIVEN RED CROSS

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 4.—That in accepting the compensation provided by law for his services as a member of the Le Grande district exemption board, Walter Pierce, democratic candidate for governor, only followed the prevailing practice, was asserted by J. D. Brown, a member of the Portland district exemption board, this morning.

"I happen to know," said Mr. Brown, "that the cent which Mr. Pierce has received in payment for exemption board work has been given by him to the Red Cross."

"As to the Le Grande board of which Mr. Pierce was a member," continued Mr. Brown, "one of its members is a one-legged man, not in circumstances which would permit him to give his services free to the exemption board work. At the same time he would be unwilling to accept the compensation allowed if the others declined it."

ARMISTICE DRASTIC DOCUMENT ENTAILS DISBANDING ARMY

(Continued from page one.)

of the allied forces in each front of the Austro-Hungarian army behind a line fixed as follows:

From Pie-Umbrai to the north of the Steylo it will follow the crest of the Rhetian Alps up to the sources of the Adige and Elan, passing thence by Mounts Reschen and Brenner and the heights of Oetz and Zoeller. The line then turns south crossing Mont Toblach and meeting the present frontier Carnic Alps. It follows this frontier up to Mount Tarvis and after Mount Tarvis the watershed of the Julian Alps by the Col of Predil, Podanisean and Idria. From this point the line turns southeast toward the Schneeburg it goes down toward the coast in such a way as to include Castua, Matuggia and Volosca in the evacuated territories.

Limits of Provinces

It will also follow the administrative limits of the present province of Dalmatia, including the North Lissarica and to the territory limited by a line from the (Semigrand) of Cape Planca to the summits of the waterphed eastwards, so as to include in the evacuated area all the valleys and water courses flowing towards Sebenico, such as the Cicola, Kerka, Zrmanja and their tributaries. It will also include all the islands in the north and west of Dalmatia from Premuda, Zelje, Ubo, Scherda, Maon, Paga and Puntadura in the north up to Meleda in the south embracing bariandrea, Busi, Lissa, Lesina, Tercola, Carzola, Carza and Lagosta, as well as the neighboring rocks and islets and passages, only excepting islands of Great and Small Zirona, Bua, Solta and Brazza. All territory thus evacuated (shall be occupied by the forces?) of the allies and of the United States of America.

All military and railway equipment of all kinds, including coal belonging to or within those territories, (to be?) left in situ and surrendered to the allies, according to special orders given by the commander-in-chief of the forces of the associated powers on the different fronts. No new destruction, pillage or requisition to be done by enemy troops in the territories to be evacuated by them and occupied by the forces of the associated powers.

Right of Movement

Four.—The allies shall have the right of free movement over all road and rail and waterways in Austro-Hungarian territory and of the use of the necessary Austrian and Hungarian territory and use of the necessary Austrian and Hungarian means of transportation. The armies of the associated powers shall occupy such strategic points in Austria-Hungary at times as they may deem necessary to enable them to conduct military operations or to maintain order. They shall have the right of requisition on payment for the troops of the associated powers (wherever?) they may be.

Five.—Complete evacuation of all German troops within 15 days not only from the Italian and Balkan fronts, but from all Austro-Hungarian territory.

Internment of all German troops which have not left Austria-Hungary within the date.

Rule Evacuated Territory

Six.—The administration of the evacuated territories of Austria-Hungary will be entrusted to the local authorities under the control of the allied and associated armies of occupation. Seven.—The immediate repatriation without reciprocity of all allied prisoners of war and internal subjects and of civil populations evacuated from their homes on conditions to be laid down by the commander-in-chief of the forces of the associated powers on the various fronts. Sick and wounded who cannot be removed from evacuated territory will be cared for by Austria-Hungary personnel who will be left on the spot with the medical material required.

Naval Conditions

One.—Immediate cessation of all hostilities at sea and definite information to be given as to the location and movements of all Austro-Hungarian ships.

Notification to be made to neutrals that freedom of navigation in all territorial waters is given to the naval and mercantile marine of the allied and associated powers, all questions of neutrality being waived.

Two.—Surrender to allies and the United States of fifteen Austro-Hungarian submarines completed between the years of 1910 and 1918 and of all German submarines which are in or may hereafter enter Austro-Hungarian territorial waters. All other Austrian warships including river craft are to be concentrated in Austro-Hungarian naval bases to be designated by the allies and the United States of America. Surrender Armament

Three.—Surrender to allies and United States with their complete armament and equipment of three battleships, three light cruisers, nine destroyers, twelve torpedo boats, one mine-layer, six submarine monitors to be designated by the allies and the United States of America. All other surface warships including river craft are to be concentrated in Austro-Hungarian naval bases to be designated by the allies and the United States of America and are to be paid off and completely disarmed and

NEW COAL VEIN BEING DEVELOPED ON ROXY ANN

Director H. M. Parks of the state bureau of mines furnishes the following:

A new coal vein has lately been discovered in the Roxy Ann district five miles northeast of Medford by Mr. W. T. Estep. This is the lowest vein of coal yet developed in this district. Mr. Estep has developed a four and a half foot vein having two small partings of shale, leaving three and a half feet thickness of first class coal. The analysis of this coal as made by the state bureau of mines is as follows:

It will be seen by the above analyses that this coal is low in moisture as compared with other western coals. The ratio of fixed carbon to volatile carbon is high, which shows it to be a bituminous coal of good quality. Its high calorific power places it in the class with the very best western coals. By comparing this analysis with that of other Oregon and Washington coals it is well toward the top of the list in actual heating value.

Mr. Estep is pushing the development as rapidly as possible. By the middle of November he expects to have two rooms opened off from the main haulage way, thus providing sufficient working face to give the mine a capacity of 10 to 15 tons daily. Southern Oregon is fortunate in having a local coal of such quality available.

placed under the supervision of allies and United States of America.

Four.—Freedom of navigation to all warships and merchant ships of allied and associated powers to be given in the Adriatic and up the river Danube and its tributaries in the territorial waters and territory of Austria-Hungary.

The allies and associated powers shall have the right to sweep up all mine fields and obstructions and the positions of these are to be indicated.

In order to insure the freedom of navigation on the Danube the allies and the United States of America shall be empowered to occupy or to dismantle all fortifications or defense works.

Blockade to Remain

Five.—The existing blockade conditions set up by the allied and associated powers to remain unchanged and all Austrian-Hungarian merchant ships found at sea are to remain liable to capture save exceptions which may be made by a commission nominated by the allies and the United States of America.

Six.—All naval aircraft are to be concentrated and impounded in Austro-Hungarian bases to be designated by the allies and United States of America.

Seven.—Evacuation of all the Italian coasts and of all ports occupied by Austria-Hungary outside their national territory and the abandonment of all floating craft, naval material, equipment and materials for inland navigation of all kinds.

Return All Prisoners

Eight.—Occupation by the allies and the United States of America of land and sea fortifications and the islands which form the defenses and of the dockyard and arsenal at Pola.

Nine.—All merchant vessels held by Austria-Hungary belonging to the allies and associated powers to be returned.

Ten.—No destruction of ships or of materials to be permitted before evacuation, surrender or restoration.

Eleven.—All naval and mercantile marine prisoners of the allied and associated powers in Austro-Hungarian hands to be returned without reciprocity.

YANKEES CLOSE STENAY GAP TO GERMAN ARMIES

(Continued from page one.)

steadily growing. The right flank of the American line is now at Hallies, on the heights overlooking the Meuse river.

American troops at 5 p. m. had advanced their left flank north of Authe, in close co-operation with the French forces which had been fighting east of the bend in the Aisne river. Further east American forces were in Authe and their patrols were reported as far north as Briell-sur-Bar.

Rapid Advance Scored

In the center of the line the village of Fosse was passed early in the day and then in quick succession Barrecoart, Nourart-le-Champyhaute and Le Champy Bas were occupied by the Americans. The advance of General Pershing's troops has reached the little lake in the center of Velval wood.

On the extreme left the Americans were north of Montigny-Dévant-Sassy. From there the line ran to the Meuse river.

It has not been a day of fighting so much as of pursuit. The Germans are not retreating in great disorder, but it is certain that the general staff and the field officers have lost control to a certain extent.

All parts of the line were active during last night. The left wing continued its advance with little interruption, even after darkness. The Americans reached Bonli-jux-Bois at 4 o'clock this morning. Their patrols were at the heels of the retreating enemy who were heard leaving the northern end of the town by wagon and who had escaped by the time the Americans had made their way through the town in the gloom.

Retreat Out of Control

There was some opposition, artillery firing and hand-to-hand fighting at Barrecoart and Nourart, but it was quickly swept away. After cleaning up Tilly last night the Americans took Hill 268 and a little later occupied Les Fontenelle farm.

From the left flank to the right there are evidences that the German officers are trying to hold their men to the task but reports from different sources agree that difficulties have arisen which the Germans have found impossible to overcome.

The village of Le Champy Haute was taken early this morning, marking an advance of five miles northward from Ravonville. The Americans did not stop there, but pressed on.

calibre, was reported today to have largely increased its booty.

The troops on the right, like those on the left and center, also continued to move forward, although less rapidly than the others.

Roads Are Blocked

East of the Meuse from north of Remoiville, where the roads are choked with retreating Germans, to north of Stenay, on the east bank of the river, where the railway yards are filled with troop trains leaving for the rear, the Germans are falling back. (From Remoiville to Stenay is about eight and a half miles.) The artillery fire from the hills behind the German lines seems to indicate the reluctance of those in command to yield to the evident desire of the men in the line to withdraw.

Equal activity is displayed behind the American lines, but it is of opposite character.

YOUNGEST CAPTAIN KILLED ON FRONT

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 4.—Captain Joseph Harfield Sweeney, aged 23, said to have been the youngest captain in the United States army when he was commissioned, was killed in action October 3, according to word received from his brother, Major Charles Sweeney. The young officer was killed at the edge of the Bois de Sentesarzes, north of Bar le Duc, in the Verdun sector.

Captain Sweeney was the son of Mrs. Emeline Sweeney. He was married in the cathedral in Baltimore last February to Miss Louise Daly of Baltimore. Cardinal Gibbons performed the ceremony. Mrs. Lillian Edwards of Oakland, Calif., is a sister.

since its retreat eastward thru Sedan and Montmedy seems about to be cut off.

East of the Meuse, the roads are crowded with the retreating Germans it is reported. This indicates a retirement to the Briey defenses, north of Metz, but the magnitude of the retrograde movement has not yet been exactly determined.

Austria will join Bulgaria and Turkey as conquered nations this afternoon at 3 o'clock. Terms of the armistice have been signed.

Trent Occupied

In the meantime, Italian and allied forces have occupied Trent and have landed at Trieste. Udine, from which General Cadorna was driven late in October, 1917, has been recaptured from the Austrians. On every front the Austrians' resistance seemed to collapse during the two days prior to the signing of the armistice terms. Belgrade, the capital of Serbia, has been recaptured from the Austrians. The city was taken on December 2, 1914.

Forty-five days after the allies launched their offensive along the Macedonian front, the Austrian army

German troops were retreating across the Danube out of Serbia, leaving behind them the wreck of German dreams of domination in the east.
