AUTO SMASHES INTO TRUCK ON STREET CROSSING

The Jackson County Creamery is working one truck short today due to having one of their large Maxwell trucks smashed up by a south bound Southern Pacific freight train at the Third street crossing this morning at about 8:20 o'clock. Lyle Pickett who was driving the truck east on Third street did not see the approaching train from the north in time to stop and the train hit his truck well past the center and turned it completely around and hit it again in front throwing it clear of the track and breaking down one of the S. P. trestle signs as well as marring the side of a telephone pole. Pickett stayed with his machine and rode it thru, coming out unharmed but pretty badly shaken up and scared.

The machine is practically a total wreck, three wheels were broken off, the frame broken in two places, body all splintered up, radiator smashed, crank case cracked and the truck generally twisted out of shape. However, strange as it may seem, neither the windshield nor two glass windows in the cab were even cracked. How the driver could come out of such a wreck without a scratch is a miracle but Pickett is right on the job the same as ever. The manager of the creamery hasn't decided whether to junk the outfit or try to have it repaired.

ROGUE RIVER BILL WINS MULTNOMAH

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 6.—Multnomah gave the following vote for supreme justice: Olson, 2,101; Cole, 1,634; Bennett, 1,245; Campbell, 576. Politicians think Olson has been elected.

The normal school measure leads by 700 in Multnomah. Estimate McNary wins by 12,000; Withycombe by somewhat less.

Multnomah gave delinquent tax a thousand majority and publication compensation measure 700 majority. Rogue river fishing carried Multnomah by 122. Willamette river fishing carried by 1100.

In the city election Commissioners Bice and Kellaher have apparently been re-elected for the long term, with S. C. Pier a close third. Perkins has been elected for the short term for commissioner.

SPENCER DEFEATS FOLK IN MISSOURI

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 6.—Returns received this morning showed that Judge Selden P. Spencer, republican, had been elected United States senator over former Governor Joseph W. Folk by an estimated majority of 23,000; that Speaker Champ Clark has been re-elected, and that Missouri has lost three democratic seats in congress.

TWO DEMOCRATS GAINED IN NEW JERSEY

TRENTON, N. J., Nov. 6.—New Jersey democrats have gained two seats in the house of representatives, according to returns up to noon, although the republicans elected their candidates for United States senate, Governor Edge for the long term and Senator Baird for the short term.

HUNS CUT TREES IN THEIR RETREAT

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY ON THE SEDAN FRONT, Nov. 6.—(By Associated Press).—In their retreat west of the Meuse, according to reports reaching American headquarters, the Germans are destroying property and cutting down trees along the roadways. American aviators reported today that the highway from Stenay northward to Oilly-sur-Chiers is blocked every few yards by trees across the roads. The destruction begins just beyond Stenay and extends northeast and north from one to three miles.

As an indication of the plight of the retreating Germans, it is known that on the entire western front the enemy has in reserve only one division which has been out of the battle one month, and four divisions which have been resting from two to four weeks. Two of the divisions are east of the Meuse.

VON BEULOW PLEADS FOR THE EMPEROR

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 6.—The semi-official Nord Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung of Berlin publishes an article written by Prince von Buelow, the former German imperial chancellor, in which he pleads for the retention of Emperor William. The prince says he considers the emperor's advocacy of the new order of things in Germany is sincere.

OKLAHOMA RE-ELECTS DEMOCRATIC TICKET

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Nov. 6.—The re-election of Senator Robert L. Owen and a gain of one democratic congressman is indicated in the returns today from slightly more than one-half of the state.
