REVOLUTION IMPENDING.

ALTHO Germany has not accepted the allied terms for an armistice, any terms the allies may impose may prove acceptable on account of the growing anarchy and the spread of Bolshevism in Germany.
 Only immediate capitulation can prevent a German military debacle as great or greater than that of Austria, for the recent advances by American, French and British forces constitute a gigantic enveloping movement which is fast cutting off the main part of the German army from retreat into Germany, and insuring a disaster of magnitude.
 Germany has never experienced a popular revolution such as that impending. England had her revolution in the seventeenth century, in the time of Oliver Cromwell, finally concluded when the Stuarts were exiled and the right of parliament to rule established. France had hers at the close of the eighteenth century. Italy, long the prey of feudal dynasties, followed in the nineteenth century, resulting in a united Italy. Smaller nations have had their revolutions and Russia is now having hers, but Germany never cast off her feudal chains for democracy.
 It is doubtful if even speedy surrender will prevent revolution in Germany. The spread of Bolshevism has been rapid. The sufferings and privations of war, the discontent of the defeated soldiers, combine to offer an inviting field for its appeal to the proletariat. The revolution is already under way in Austria and is bound to spread to the oppressed millions of Germany.
 The birth pangs of democracy are always painful. Wild excess marks the intoxication of freedom and power among those to whom it has always been denied, and it is questionable whether the German, even with his ingrained habits of docility and servitude will prove any exception. Germany will probably witness scenes similar to those of the reign of terror in France, and to the present carnival of crime in Russia. Only a people who have learned by bitter experience that liberty is a precious heritage, to be used and not abused, are fitted for democracy.
 As part of the president's program is to make democracy safe for the world as well as make the world safe for democracy, it is probable that allied armies will have to be kept in the field for some time to assist the new democracies in establishing government, maintaining order and preventing chaos, anarchy and bloodshed, such as invariably results from the attempts of the ignorant to establish by force and injustice class governments.

LABOR SURVEY
BEING MADE OF
LOCAL INDUSTRY

The local community labor board is now working on a complete labor survey. Questionnaires will very soon be in the hands of all manufacturers in this district, including box factories, saw mills, logging camps, mines, flour and feed mills, canneries, dryers, cigar factories, confectioneries, foundries, non-alcoholic drink manufacturers, power and lighting companies, railways (not operated by U. S. R. R. administration).
 The labor board, as a department of the U. S. employment service, will have a big duty to perform in the way of directing labor from non-essential to essential work, assisting in the retraining of men, who may be called by the draft, by women or older men in the different essential industries, and employers whose plants are doing war work, either direct or indirect, in retaining their "key" men or men who cannot be readily replaced.
 The community labor board works absolutely in conjunction with the local draft board, and consequently has an intelligent line on all men who may be needed for active service, but who are still available for essential lines of industry.
 In order to assist in every possible way the work of our local community labor board, it is the wish of the director general and the state director that all employers secure their labor whenever possible, through the United States employment service. In this manner working in close co-operation with the local community labor board and the local draft board.
 The local community labor board for this immediate district is composed of men who may be relied upon to handle the proposition in a fair and square manner and who will intelligently and without any favoritism draw from any and all industries that labor which is now on non-essential work. They will also take into consideration, very carefully, the general local conditions which must always be reckoned with.

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
NEWBERRY LEADS
