1 KILLED, 2 SHOT IN CELEBRATION

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 8.—Celebration of the fake report that the Germans had signed the armistice agreement caused one death, the shooting of two and the more or less serious injury of fourteen other persons. The deaths, shooting and accidents occurred yesterday afternoon and last night. Joyous crowds, believing Germany had surrendered, revealed in the city's streets.

Nicola Francino, 15 years old, was killed by an unknown person while standing in front of his home watching a parade. He fell with a bullet in his neck.

George Wharton, a policeman, was shot in the leg by some unknown person in a crowd.

Wm. G. Schorn, 47, was shot in the neck. A young girl revolver was arrested charged with firing the shot.

COUNTRY HOAXED BY FAKE REPORT INTO CELEBRATION

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Millions of Americans realized today that they had been hoaxed into celebrating the end of the war by publication of the United Press dispatches declaring the armistice signed and fighting ended.

Each hour brings added official evidence that the reports were false and that the American people were fooled. Not only have official communications from France to the state department at Washington denounced the reports as untrue, but the official statements of the French and British war offices show the fighting still going on.

The Associated Press did not receive or distribute any of the dispatches which misled the American people into celebrating the greatest hoax of recent years. On the other hand, by investigation thru official channels, the Associated Press was able to expose it.

REICHSTAG TO MEET TONIGHT

PARIS, Nov. 8.—(4:26 p. m.)—Leaders of the various parties in the Reichstag will meet tonight to determine the course to be taken on the conditions of the armistice, says a dispatch from Berlin to Bern printed in the Paris Temps this afternoon.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—The French wireless service has given out a dispatch sent by General Winterfeldt of the German armistice delegation to the German high command, announcing that a courier, Captain Heldorff, will cross the line between 6 o'clock and 8 o'clock tonight and that the French command has taken measures for his safety.

AID FOR RUSSIA NEEDED AT ONCE OR BE TOO LATE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Additional aid must be furnished Russia by the allied and United States governments at once if that nation is to be saved, says an appeal to President Wilson from the United Russian Provisional government at Omsk, which was in the hands of the state department today.

The appeal which was delivered to Secretary Lansing yesterday by Boris Lakhmeteff, Russian ambassador to the United States, declared that assistance already furnished the Russian people will be in vain if "the new help arrives too late."

"Every hour of delay threatens with innumerable calamities Russia, the allies and other nations," says the appeal.
