

POWER COMPANY ASKS INCREASE IN CALIFORNIA RATES

The California-Oregon Power company has applied to the California state railroad commission for permission to raise its rates in this state.

The company sets forth that no valuation of its properties has been made and that a reasonable reproduction cost of the property in California is \$1,709,997.61 and that the value of its property in Oregon is \$2,701,352.37.

Its revenue exhibit shows gross earnings in the six years ending January 1, 1918, of \$2,353,006, of which \$1,285,893 were net operating expenses.

A statement of its revenue for the first eight months of 1918 shows a gross revenue of \$341,005, of which \$159,713 represents the return on its California business.
