YANKS THINK OF MOTHER WHEN HIT BY BULLET

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMIES IN THE FIELD, Oct. 15.—(Correspondence of Associated Press.) When an American soldier goes "over the top" or when he receives a bullet or shrapnel wound he thinks of his mother.

This fact is borne out by the officers and doctors who have served in all three of the allied armies. They declare that when the American soldier is wounded, the first word on his lips is almost in every case "Mother."

The correspondent of the Associated Press at the American front asked a number of soldiers what thought was most on their minds when they first left their trenches to attack the Germans.

There were a few, however, who said that as they entered the battle their minds were given over wholly to prayer, although they had never before been in the habit of praying.

FOODSTUFF CREDIT ALLOWED TO ITALY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—A credit of \$100,000,000 for Italy was announced today by the treasury. This will be used largely to pay for foodstuffs and war supplies already ordered by the Italian government in this country and in process of manufacture or export.

THE HUN STILL A HUN

CAN the leopard change his spots, the Ethiopian his skin or the Hun his inbred savagry? Not in this generation, at all events.

The Hun is humbled by failure, but not repentant. The German nation is mortified and chagrined, but not penitent. Not a single expression showing regret for frightfulness and barbarism has come out of the country.

The Germans have turned against the kaiser, because of the war's failure—not because of his crimes. They are enraged like a beast despoiled of prey. Not since the war began has ruthlessness aroused a protest in Germany.

We have just had a celebration in America to applaud the defeat of the powers of evil that threatened the liberties of the world. Germany had a similar jubilee when the Lusitania was sunk and a thousand innocent men, women and children perished in defiance of the law of God and man.

The mark of the beast is upon them all—nobles and people, clergy and scholars, officers and privates, and civilians, because for two generations, from the cradle the philosophy of the brute has been scientifically inculcated in them all to make them amenable to the feudal autocracy's program of conquest and eager agents in its execution.

It is too much to expect that the Germans of this generation will be other than they are—the humiliation of failure may convince them of the error of their ways.

The allied nations, however, cannot descend to the level of the Germans. They must uphold the principles and ideals of Christianity and civilization.
