

ANARCHY EXISTS IN AUSTRIA - HUNGARY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Reports have reached the state department that the situation in Germany and Austria-Hungary approximates a state of anarchy on account of the conduct of returning soldiers released from the fighting lines.

GENEVA, Switzerland, Nov. 15.—Charles, the former Austrian emperor, and Zita, his wife, according to the Vienna Arbeiter Zeitung, left Vienna last night on a special train. They are expected to cross the Swiss frontier today at Buchs on the left bank of the Rhine.

Pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 224 General Laws of Oregon, 1913, notice is hereby given that the County Court of Jackson County, Oregon, will meet in the Circuit Court Room of the Court House in the City of Jacksonville, Oregon, on Thursday, the 5th day of December, 1918, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m. of said day, and at the said time and place opportunity will be given for a full and complete discussion of the estimate of the amount of money proposed to be raised by taxation for the ensuing year as published herewith, by any taxpayer subject to such tax levy when made, in favor of or against any of the proposed tax levies herein as the County Court may deem for the best interests of Jackson County.
