NOT A LA BISMARCK

IT would be poetic justice were the allies to adopt some of the methods in Germany that Bismarck advocated and enforced in France in the Franco-Prussian war.

In collecting taxes levied upon French cities, Bismarck advocated "a big column of infantry with some horse artillery and a couple of guns. They need not even enter a place" said the iron chancellor "but simply send in a message 'If you do not produce the outstanding taxes—in two hours shells will be thrown in.' Then they will see you are in earnest, and then pay. In some instances a place will be really bombarded, so as to encourage the others. They must learn what war really is."

These methods were scientifically improved upon by the Germans during their occupancy of Belgium and France and resulted in completely denuding the conquered region of its wealth and property.

In feeding the starving people of Paris, Bismarck advocated putting them upon half rations, then starving them a little so as to make them amenable to German control.

The allies will, of course, do nothing of the kind, but treat the Germans with a decency and chivalry they have not earned—because nations professing themselves civilized cannot do otherwise.

OUTLOOK GOOD FOR HARMONY

THE new house of representatives will have a working majority of republicans. The new senate will have a republican majority of two.

Lack of able leadership will handicap efforts to play politics in congress—the course there will be a frantic effort to conjure up some issue to rally the opposition for the 1920 campaign.

There will be, and there has been, a determined effort to restore an excessive protective tariff—to shift the burden of taxation now piled upon the wealthy thru income taxation to the dinner table of the masses thru heavy duties upon necessities—to create new tariff built-fortunes for the few at the expense of the many.

There will also be an effort to maintain a huge permanent military establishment and provide universal military training. Both of these questions await the final end of the war and the formation of a league of nations.

Outside of the usual partisan claptrap and bombast, these policies of the president deserving support will probably receive it from both parties, for they will receive popular endorsement that will compel it.
