RED CROSS STOPS SENDING WORKERS TO BATTLE FIELDS

Miss Margaret Strong Ames, who had volunteered for Red Cross work overseas, has received the following notice from her and others who had applied for overseas work...

"Dear Miss Ames: The following telegram received today from Washington, D. C., will be of interest to you.

"Cables received today cancel all personal requisitions for French and English commissions. Until further advised send no more applications to Washington. Cancel by fast wire all instructions issued to personnel to report New York. In notifying applicants that Red Cross cannot send them overseas incorporate following in your communication to each applicant:

"While the cessation of hostilities is the cause of universal joy, it will also bring about a change in Red Cross activities abroad requiring a substantial reduction in the number of workers whom we are authorized to send. Cables received today require us to notify you we will be unable to send you abroad and while we quite sympathize in your desire, we feel sure that you will appreciate the necessity of prompt notification so as to save as much inconvenience to you and expense to the Red Cross as possible. Please accept sincere thanks for your offer of service."

OREGON TROOPS IN ARMY OF OCCUPATION

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—According to official information released by the war department, the One Hundred Seventeenth sanitary train, formerly Ambulance company No. 1, Oregon National Guard, is included in the American Third army, known as the army of occupation, which is marching into Germany under command of Major General Dickman.

These are the only Oregon troops included in the American Third army, it is stated.

WARDEN STATES PAROLE OFFICER BOSSES PRISON

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 23.—"I beg to differ with the executive when he says that his reason that I was asked to resign was that I was extravagant," says Charles A. Murphy, who has been asked by Governor Withycombe to resign the position of warden at the state penitentiary.

"The real reason," he continues, "is that I have never been amenable to the control of the parole officer, refused to play the game his way and, therefore he has demanded my official seal and secured it."

Continuing his comment about Parole Officer Keller, Captain Murphy says:

"He has assumed an open dictatorship, and through his boasted control over the executive insofar as they pertain to prison matters and the paroling of prisoners, has caused disorder in the peaceful operation of the institution. He has also given direct orders to employees of the institution. Some measure of weight is given to his boasts by the fact that his advice and counsel appear to be accepted by the governor without investigation as to the truth or falsity of his representations.

"By reason of his boasted control he wields a secret but powerful influence over combined fear and hatred among the inmates of the prison to such an extent as to amount to a dictatorship over the term of their service of sentences. If a man did not bow his head and bend the knee to the parole officer he was doomed to serve until he died."
