CANCEL CONTRACTS FOR WOOD SHIPS

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 25.—Several Puget Sound wooden shipyards announced today they had received telegrams from the Emergency Fleet Corporation at Washington, D. C., cancelling contracts for wooden vessels on which work had not yet begun.

Shipyard officials estimated that between 20 and 30 contracts in Washington were cancelled. Seattle officers of the fleet corporation refused to comment on the order.

FOOTBALL STAR KILLED IN FRANCE

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 25.—Lieut. Joseph Puff, former all-American football star and a noted gradiron star of many seasons, was killed in action in France October 14, according to word last received here by relatives. In 1912 he graduated from Princeton, in the same year being named an "all-American" guard. He coached the Princeton varsity team that fall and the University of Pittsburgh eleven of 1913 and 1914.

UNCLE SAM TO BUY ALL RADIO PLANTS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—Hearings will begin before the house merchant marine committee December 12, on an administration bill which provides for permanent government control of radio communication through the purchase and operation of all shore stations in this country used for commercial purposes.
