SEPARATION GROWING.

"BECAUSE of the continuous deceit of the Berlin government" the new republic of Bavaria has broken off relations with Berlin, seeks separate representation at the peace conference and a separate peace. The liberty party in Baden has also demanded a break with Berlin.

Defeat promises to undo the work of German union that victory and Bismarck accomplished. For many centuries southern Germany had little in common with Prussia, and maintained its independence, politically, religiously and economically.

Defeat has shattered the spell wrought by military success half a century ago and all Germany is coming out of the hypnotic trance of military autocracy. It would not be at all surprising if Germany again became a land of independent states, while among the possibilities are the union of southern German states with the German Austrian states into a new confederation, leaving Prussia to shift for herself as of old.

Prussia may become Bolshevik, but there is little danger that the more conservative populations of Bavaria, Saxony, Baden and Wurtemberg will hoist the red flag. In any event, either as separate states or as two states, Germany will cease to be the menace to the world she has been for half a century.

THE GOOD SHIP MEDFORD.

A GRACEFUL compliment has been paid Medford by Eric V. Hauser, manager of the Grant-Smith Porter shipyards in the naming of one of the new fleet of wooden ships after the city.

The vessel is the next to the last of the fleet of fifty ships built for the Emergency Fleet corporation and will be launched before December 10. It will give this city a personal interest in the fortunes of the fleet, particularly in this vessel.

No charges of profiteering discredit the building of the Medford, for the profits made by the builders have been turned back into war work—which reflects great credit on the contractors.

The Medford will have a cargo capacity of 3,500 tons and be one of the finest finished vessels turned out, with all modern conveniences. Its launching will be a sight worth seeing and Medford people are urged to be present, to show their appreciation of the honor.

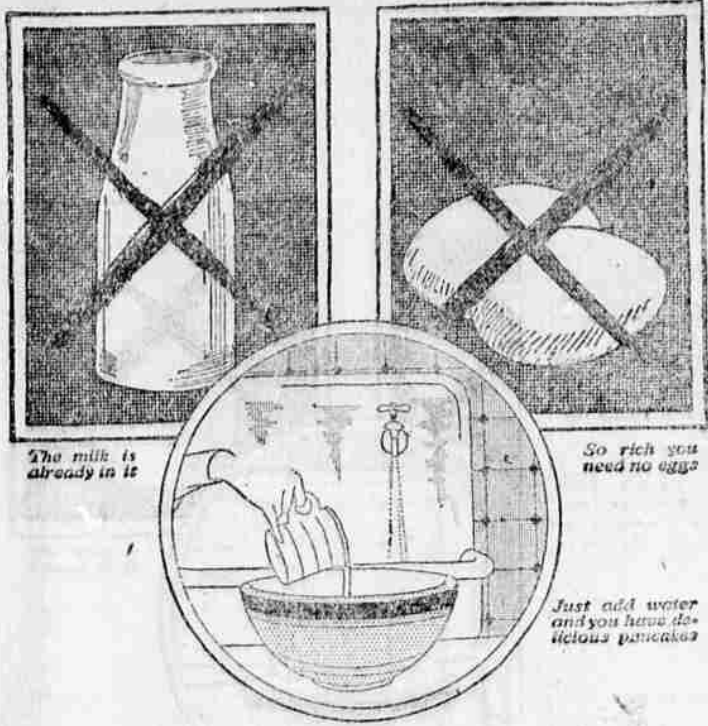
BRITISH REGULATE PRICE OF APPLES

E. M. McKeany, who is local representative of Dennis, Kimball and Pope, apple exporters, wires as follows from New York City, explaining the raising the apple embargo and the conditions faced by the exporters: "Embargo on apples to British ports raised. Limited space is available and a few shipments are now being made. Ocean freight is \$2 per box. British government has established a maximum price of 12 1/2 cents per pound for the fruit. Estimate 40 cents net to the box."

DESTROY AIRPLANES TO BE SURRENDERED

BASEL, Switzerland, Nov. 29.—One hundred and fifty airplanes, which had been gathered at Boedingen airdrome, 41 miles southwest of Stuttgart, to be handed over to the allies in accordance with the provisions of the armistice have been rendered useless by order of the revolutionary committee, according to a Stuttgart dispatch received here.

Mrs. Will Loomis is reported to be critically ill at her home on North Central avenue.

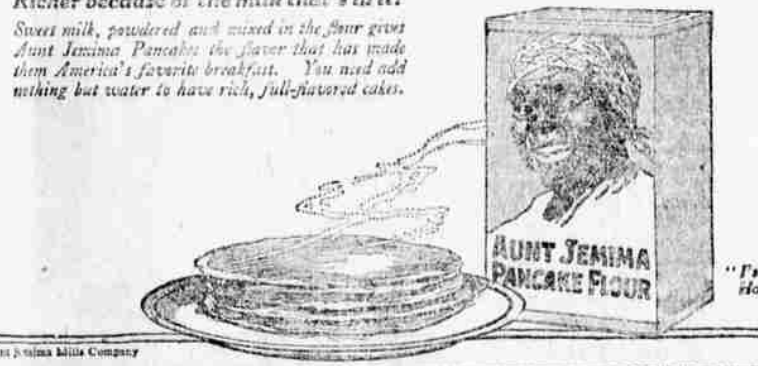
