JAP MINISTRY MARKS ADVENT OF RULE OF PEOPLE

TOKIO, Oct. 30.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—The new cabinet headed by Takashi Hara is hailed as marking the advent of popular government in Japan. For 50 years the champions of representative government have been struggling for a system under which the premier would be selected for that post because he was the leader of the majority party in the house of representatives. This has been accomplished when Mr. Hara was chosen. During that half century the government has been in the hands of clans and court circles generally styled bureaucratic. On the other hand Mr. Hara is a commoner. He has selected as members of his cabinet those of this party, introducing

bureaucrats only as ministers of war and navy, who under the regulations must be chosen from army and navy circles.

"My ideal has at last been realized," exclaimed Marquis Okuma, Japan's "grand old man" who has labored always for the cause of democratic government. "The whole nation should support the Hara ministry if they are really desirous of the development of constitutional politics in Japan. Japan should have new men, young and vigorous, who are able to handle important affairs of state."

One of the first decisions adopted by the new cabinet was to abolish the custom of detaining detectives to accompany ministers wherever they might go and the opening of the ministerial apartments so that the people might have a freer access to them.
