Perry, sought in connection with the death by shooting of Captain Abram Posner at Escondido, was captured by three deputy sheriffs of Los Angeles county at Hualmdale, about 75 miles northeast of here, shortly before noon today. The officers reported by telephone without giving details, and said they would return with their prisoner, reaching here late today.
