CLARENCE REAMES INJURED BY AUTO

SEATTLE, Dec. 3.—Clarence L. Reames, special assistant United States attorney general, who sustained serious injuries when he was struck down by an automobile Monday, is in an improved condition at the Columbus sanitarium here today.

Reames was resting easy and apparently out of danger.

Louis H. Heymanson, head of the Puget Sound Manufacturing company driver of the car that struck Reames, was released immediately following his arrest by a department of justice official. In his statement to the police Heymanson stated Reames apparently did not see the automobile.

The automobile leader hurried Reames clear of the machine, but he struck the pavement with sufficient force to break three ribs and sustain severe lacerations.

SENATE DISCUSSES PEACE PRINCIPLES STATED BY WILSON

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—General discussion of President Wilson's 14 peace principles was started in the senate today by a speech of Senator Frelinghuysen of New Jersey, republican, advocating a resolution he had introduced calling upon the president to make a public declaration interpreting the principles.

Senator Frelinghuysen said the president's 14 principles were open to various interpretations and added: "The president should not on behalf of the American people make radical proposals until he is sure that they are endorsed by the people."

Senator Walsh of Montana, democrat, declared that lack of criticism until recently of the president's 14 terms had justified general belief in their acceptability. Senators Knox of Pennsylvania and Poindexter of Washington, republicans, sharply dissented.

During the debate Senator Borah of Idaho, republican, introduced a resolution providing for publication of the peace terms as soon as agreed upon, and for open discussion during consideration of the treaty in the senate.

PARIS, Tuesday, Dec. 3.—The royal Montenegro government has issued a statement denying the report that King Nicholas has been deposed.

Governor Withycombe denounced today as "prejudiced and unfair," the grand jury report in the state penitentiary investigation.

"The report is and was intended to be a whitewash for Warden Murphy," said the governor. "There are a number of misstatements in it. I am disappointed that the report does not say a single word about graft at the prison when the purpose for which it was called into special session was to detect graft."

"Pratie is given the commissary department with its boasted \$30,000 stock. I think it shows poor business judgment on the part of Warden Murphy to stock up so heavily at a time when prices are so high."

Warden Murphy's resignation recently was asked by the governor. The warden declared that his dismissal was due to the influence with the governor of State Parole Officer Keller. Charges against Keller resulted in the grand jury investigation of prison affairs.
