DISILLUSIONED.

THE studied indifference with which Germans are receiving the American army of occupation reflects the stupor which seems to have overtaken the nation following its military collapse. To Germans trained to believe in German supremacy as a divine right, and to regard German arms as invincible, defeat must seem incomprehensible. No wonder the people seem stunned.

Among the letters printed in the forum of the New York World, May 1, 1915, was the following, which reflects the then prevalent German idea of invincibility:

How foolish it is for the enemies of the Germans to think that they could conquer them! No, not if all the other peoples of the earth, both civilized and savage, were opposed to them they could not be victorious over the great German people, for while one German remains—man, woman or child—they will fight on, and it would not be easy to exterminate seventy millions of people; and therefore you can see that final victory is assured to us, and when we have humbled our enemies in the dust and taken their countries from them, if any one of the former natives, either Englishman, Frenchman, Italian, American or any other of the inferior races, were to raise their voices above a whisper we will crush them to the earth.

And again, after we have destroyed all of the worn-out cathedrals and other hideous buildings, including the temples of India and other heathen countries, we will build much greater cathedrals and far more magnificent temples to honor our noble Kaiser and the great deeds of his people in destroying the carion races of the world.

Oh, how thankful we are that God has selected our great and incomparable Kaiser and his people to accomplish this great work, for has not Darwin said, (who I think, must have got his idea from our great German professors) "that only the fittest must survive," and are not the Germans the most fit in every way? So we Germans say, "Let the carion rot; there are no noble men but Germans." CARL SCHROEDER. New York, May 1, 1915.

Germany was then victorious in every field and the opinions expressed were those of Germans all over the world, who continued to cherish the illusions until the tide of victory was transformed into the flood of defeat this autumn.

In order to make Germany fully realize and understand that the German system of "might makes right" is a failure, that military might does not spell world dominion, that barbaric "kultur" leads only to disaster, that fightfulness does not pay and that boasted German superiority is a myth, it is necessary to bring home to Germans the evils of war by the occupation of their homeland by the conquering army. The Germans thus have an object lesson before them that effectually disillusion them.

The army of occupation will not systematically destroy and ravage the country, deport and enslave the civilian population, massacre the helpless and indulge in the orgy of brutality practiced wherever Germans occupied conquered territory, but will furnish a never failing reminder of German defeat and serve as a collector of the bill that reckless ambition and barbarian frightfulness have piled upon the German people to pay.

The Germans proved that they were not supermen,—could not stand the gaff of defeat, were animated by no sustaining high moral principle, that they would not fight on for final victory and that in this respect they were not a superior people, but inferior in stamnia and courage to the despised "inferior" peoples, whom they had supposedly destroyed.

No magnificent temples will be built to honor the "noble Kaiser"—and the only "carrion" that is left to rot is the carcase of German militarism and the dead dream of "Deutschland uber alles."

PLAN CREATION OF NEW STATE FROM GERMAN ISLANDS

SYDNEY, Australia, Nov. 5.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) Pronouncement by Arthur J. Balfour, British secretary of state for foreign affairs, that Germany's colonies will not be returned to her after the war arrives in Australia and New Zealand animated discussion of the future of all the islands in the Pacific south of the equator.

Whatever conclusion is reached by the allies at the peace conference as to the disposition of German New Guinea and German Samoa, not to mention the Marshall, Caroline and Ladrones groups, it is generally admitted that an entire recasting of the various administrations of the British Islands is needed to develop their great potential wealth, afford security for trade and ensure adequate defense.

It is believed that a federation of all the British archipelago under a central authority having its seat of government at the most convenient centre will eventuate after the war.

Thus, in effect a new state would be created which might be called the British Pacific Federation and might be administered by a governor-general or high commissioner. Such a governor-general or high commissioner would not be concerned with the local governmental affairs of any particular group but with the federation as a whole. He might be assisted by a council composed of appointed officials, representatives elected by each island group, and trade commissioners representing Great Britain, Australia, New Zealand and Canada. Local legislatures, would, under such a scheme as this, have as large a measure of self-government as compatible with the proportion of whites to South Sea Islanders and Asiatics, incapable at present of self-government.

BREST TO CELEBRATE WILSON'S ARRIVAL MOST ELABORATELY

PARIS, Dec. 6.—The city council of Brest, where President Wilson will land, is preparing an elaborate reception for the American chief executive says a telegram from the mayor of Brest, a socialist, to the Paris socialist newspaper, Humanite.

"The president probably will land in that part of the commercial harbor where the American troops disembarked," the telegram continues. "In that case on the road from the port to the railroad depot there will be a triumphal arch of Gorse and Broom (national plants of Brittany). Under it the mayor will present an address on behalf of the city council. On the route of the procession there will be erected in silhouette a large reproduction of the Statue of Liberty in New York, visible from all parts of the roadstead.

"Across the streets will be hung long bands of calico with such inscriptions as 'homage to the champion of liberty,' 'long live the apostle of international justice.' "There will be public celebrations, illuminations and meetings at which President Wilson's role will be set forth and his name acclaimed."

JORDAN DENIES PRO-GERMANISM

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Dec. 6.—Any statement by German agents or any one else that I was actively or passively pro-German during the war or at any other time is an unqualified falsehood," Dr. David Starr Jordan, chancellor emeritus of Stanford university said here today when told of the disclosure of the diary of Dr. Karl A. Fuehr, a German agent, containing his name as a person of supposed pro-German tendencies.

"In November and December of 1913 I lectured in Germany itself against certain of the government evils there. I have always held the German government and its agents to be most detestable. I did not know von Bernstorff or any other German agent. I communicated with von Bernstorff but once, when I sent him a letter from an Australian lady protesting against Germany's tactics in the war. I received no reply."

WOMEN CONDUCTORS AGREE TO QUIT WORK

CLEVELAND, O., Dec. 6.—Normal street car service in this city was resumed at 5 o'clock this morning after a complete tie-up since 5 o'clock Tuesday morning when 2400 motormen and conductors went on strike to force the company to dismiss 150 women conductors. President Stanley of the Cleveland Railway company promised in an agreement signed last night to do this by March 1.

Representatives of the women conductors said the latter were willing to sacrifice their positions rather than subject the city to the inconvenience of a prolonged labor war.

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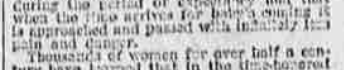
