BLAKELEY—Lloyd Herbert Blakeley, instructor of manual training at the high school, died at Sacred Heart hospital at 6:30 p. m., Dec. 8, from influenza, aged 24 years, 11 months. He was born in New York and married in 1917 to Pearl Satterly of Newport, Oregon. Since coming to Medford he has been prominent in school life, was a member of the Methodist church, and served as a sergeant in the home guards. He is survived by his wife and a seven months old baby, his father, Herbert Blakeley of Waldron, Ark., and brother, Vincent Blakeley. Burial will be in I. O. O. F. cemetery in charge of the Medford military company, announcement to be made later.

AUSTRALIA PLANS ADOPTION OF NEW WELFARE CODE

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 8.—Australia will solve its industrial problems by the adoption of a new social code that every worthy citizen is entitled to a minimum standard of comfort bearing some relation to the total wealth production of the community, but above that minimum full play will be given to individual enterprise, initiative and intelligence.

This is the conclusion of the Hon. George Healy, member of the Australian coalition government, and writer and lecturer on economic problems who recently began here a four months inquiry into plans for reconstruction in the United States.

Australia, he said, has no fear of revolutionary disorders. The most dangerous element being a small minority of the very active. The problem of obtaining comfortable standards of living without paternalism, is being met, he said, with a great educational movement seeking to create mutual lines of respect by which enterprise may be conducted.

The only state in Australia which is at present under a labor government recently attempted to reduce the cost of meat to consumers by starting government ranches and butcher shops.

The idea of state control of food supplies is rapidly giving way to agitation of voluntary cooperation among primary producers. The producer now seeks to eliminate intermediate profits and is trying to get nearer the consumer, looking to cooperation as against state assistance as his media.

M'ADOO ASKS FOR LOANS FOR FOOD

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—Congress was asked by Secretary McAdoo to authorize loans after the declaration of peace to governments which have been associated with the United States in the war to aid in feeding and reconstructing devastated countries.

The secretary estimated that about a billion and a half dollars of war bonds already authorized will be available for this purpose, but loans cannot be continued after peace is proclaimed without specific legislative authority.

A special meeting of the House Ways and Means committee, to which the request was addressed, was called for Wednesday to hear Mr. McAdoo and Assistant Secretary Livingston on the subject.
