

RESTORE PASSENGER SERVICE TO BEFORE THE WAR SYSTEM

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Restoration of normal passenger service has now been undertaken by the railroad administration, said Director General McArdoo today in a statement addressed to the American people withdrawing his plea made last January for curtailment of passenger travel for the war emergency.

A number of trains, he announced, will be added to existing schedules within the next few weeks.

"The war now being practically over," said the statement, "it will be the policy of the railroad administration during the remaining period of federal control to give to the public the best service of which the railroads are capable. As rapidly as possible, service will be improved, although trains which were run under private control merely for competitive reasons, will not be restored. Such service was unnecessary.

"Plans have already been made for service to California, Florida and the southeastern states during the coming winter. The public may be assured that the railroad administration will do everything possible to meet the needs of the traveling public."

GLASS MAKERS STRIKE ON MOONEY'S BEHALF

TOLEDO, Ohio, Dec. 10.—Protesting against the life imprisonment sentence of Thomas Mooney of San Francisco, four hundred employees of the Libbey Glass company are striking. Of this number 200 went out last night and 200 more today. They are planning a public demonstration.

AMERICA READY TO MANUFACTURE BIG BERTHA GUNS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Ordinance development during the war has brought cannon-makers to the point where the 24-inch rifle is easily practicable, Major General F. W. Coe, chief of coast artillery, said today in his annual report. The nominal range of a gun of this size would be forty miles, the report says, but "longer ranges for special types are possible if desired."

The limit has not yet been approached in the size of tractor drawn artillery, declares General Coe, intimating that a successor to the German "big Bertha" is to be expected.

"In the case of harbor defenses," the report declares, "the existing armament lacks in power when judged by latest standards. In order to provide for the unhampered movements of our own fleets in leaving important harbors it will undoubtedly be necessary in many cases to supplement the existing defenses with the highest power largest caliber guns, placed as far to the front as possible."

LIBERTY LOAN TITLE WILL BE RETAINED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—The next popular war loan, to be issued in the spring, probably will be known as the "Fifth Liberty loan." Some substitute such as "Victory Issue" however, may be appended. War loan managers have decided that the advertising value of the term Liberty is too great to be discarded and will present their recommendation to the new secretary of the treasury, Carter Glass, after he takes office Monday.

COUNTY FARMERS FORM BUREAUS ON FEDERAL PLAN

A very important and successful meeting of what has been heretofore known as the Jackson County Agricultural council was held yesterday at the public library, when it was decided to adopt the form of organization for the farmers of the county which has been urged by the federal department of agriculture, known as the Farmers Bureau system. The majority of the eastern states have already adopted such county organization but Jackson county is the first county in Oregon to do so.

The purpose of the Farmers Bureau as stated in the by-laws is "to promote the development of the most profitable and permanent system of agriculture; the most wholesome and satisfactory living conditions; the highest ideals in home and community life, and a genuine interest in the farm business and rural life on the part of the boys and girls and young people."

The Farm Bureau proposes to do its work thru departments or projects. Each of these will be directed by a project leader, the following leaders being elected for the Jackson county organization yesterday:

- Dairying—F. C. Holibaugh. Poultry production—H. W. Frame. Livestock shipping—Victor Bursnell. Rodent and pest control—F. C. Holmes. Organization—A. C. Joy. Field demonstration—H. A. Earhart. Horticulture—E. W. Carleton. Farm records—J. D. Lowe. It will be the work of the Farm Bureau during the winter to interest every farmer in Jackson county in the organization of farm activities and make him a member of the Farm Bureau. REFUSE CITIZENSHIP TO ALIEN SLACKERS

CAMP LEWIS, Tacoma, Wash., Dec. 10.—Army officers here today praise the action of United States District Judge Jeremiah Netter in refusing citizenship to twelve aliens who before the signing of the armistice in Europe attempted to obtain exemption from the army because they were subjects of neutral countries, but who since that time applied for American citizenship.

Similar action it is believed here will be followed by federal courts throughout the country in hundreds of like cases. Eleven of the twelve men denied citizenship were Swedes or Norwegians, one was a Dane. Judge Netter refused to admit the aliens at naturalization hearing yesterday that lasted until a late hour at night. During the day he did make citizens of 532 aliens caught here in the draft who wanted to become Americans. The hearing will be the last held in camp, it was announced. Heretofore hearings have been held each month and soldiers qualified were made citizens upon application, thus doing away with first and second papers and a wait of years. Soldiers who have not availed themselves of the short cut to citizenship may still take the short step if they apply to the federal court within six months after their discharge.

Seven hundred portable houses for various uses were sent to France by the Red Cross. The American Red Cross provided one out of every 10 soldiers in France with a corn cob pipe. LOWER HOG PRICES IN UNITED STATES

CHICAGO, Dec. 10.—Extensive changes in average prices on hogs at various livestock centers have been undertaken by the United States food administration's stabilization and control committee. At a meeting of the committee held here it was announced today that the average price set at Pittsburg, for example, will hereafter be \$17.65 as against \$17.80 which has recently prevailed there.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—An embargo on hog shipments to the Union Stock Yards, Chicago, until Thursday, was authorized today by the railroad administration.

The yards now have enough accumulation on hand and in transit to keep them busy until Thursday, and the embargo to prevent serious congestion was recommended by the bureau of markets of the department of agriculture and stock yards officials. Shipments will be resumed Thursday.

HITCHCOCK DEFENDS POLICY

Albert Bushnell Hart of Harvard university, pointed to his record and to his published articles on the war before the senate judiciary committee today, as evidence that his name had no place on the German "list of important names" in the committee's investigation of German propaganda. Professor Hart described his acquaintance with pro-Germans and declared that he did not share their views at any time. He said he refused to join the German University Alliance at the invitation of Otto Merkel, of New York, because he did not wish to become identified with such an organization. The American Red Cross sent 3000 tons of condensed milk to the children of prisoners in Archangel, Siberia, and 2000 pounds of powdered milk to the children of France.

KAISER'S INTERNMENT IN HOLLAND A FARCE

PARIS, Monday, Dec. 9.—The city council of Spa has documentary evidence proving that a Dutch general came to Spa to meet the former German emperor before his flight into Holland, according to the Matin.
