ARMY AVIATOR IS AGAIN SEEN BY EAGLE POINTERS

Lieutenant Hoagland passed over Eagle Point at 11 o'clock this morning and was plainly seen, as the sky was fairly clear in that part of the county. Senator H. Von der Hellen telephoned the Tribune that the machine passed directly over his house and looked about the size of a chicken hawk. The motor was beating regularly and could be distinctly heard. The aviator appeared to be returning on the same course he flew north which must have taken him east of Rosey Anne. Several Medford people watched the skies patiently 15 minutes after the flier left Eagle Point but as far as reported nothing was seen or heard of the machine.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Dec. 11.—Lieutenant A. F. Hoagland, army aviator, who stopped here over night on his return flight from Seattle to Sacramento, left at 9:45 o'clock today on the last lap of his journey. The weather was fair and he intended to make no stop between here and Sacramento unless he encountered bad weather.

Hundreds of people turned out today to see the aviator start for the south. His stop at Roseburg yesterday afternoon was unexpected and was due partly to slight engine trouble. No landing place had been designated here but after flying above the city for a half hour, Lieutenant Hoagland alighted at the coast artillery target range. The schools were dismissed and thousands of people went to meet him.

Should the flier not be able to reach Sacramento today, he declared he would stop at Redding, Calif.

Some "Flu" Suggestions

Keep regular habits. Retire early, arise early, if in robust condition a cold bath upon arising is an excellent tonic for the system.

OUR FATALITIES IN TRAINING FOR WAR WERE 152

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—An appeal by Premier Clemenceau of France for an American contribution of two thousand planes a month, and a total of five thousand aviators, and 50,000 specialized mechanics, formed the basis for the aircraft program to which the United States committed itself in the war. Major General William Kenley, director of military aeronautics, disclosed today in his annual report.

Despite this handicap, 4,980 men had been graduated as reserve military aviators, the first rating for pilots by June 30, 1918, the report says and 110 bombers, 85 bombing pilots, 464 observers, 38 observer pilots and 131 pursuit pilots had been graduated on that date from the advanced training school.

In the year ending last June 30, there were 152 fatalities in training, or an average of one death to 2,684 hours and 201,000 miles flown. Stalled engines, usually due to an error of the pilot, caused 86 deaths; collisions 30, and side slips 10.

As a matter of aerial statistics, the report says, fatalities in American training are less than half as large as those of other allied countries.

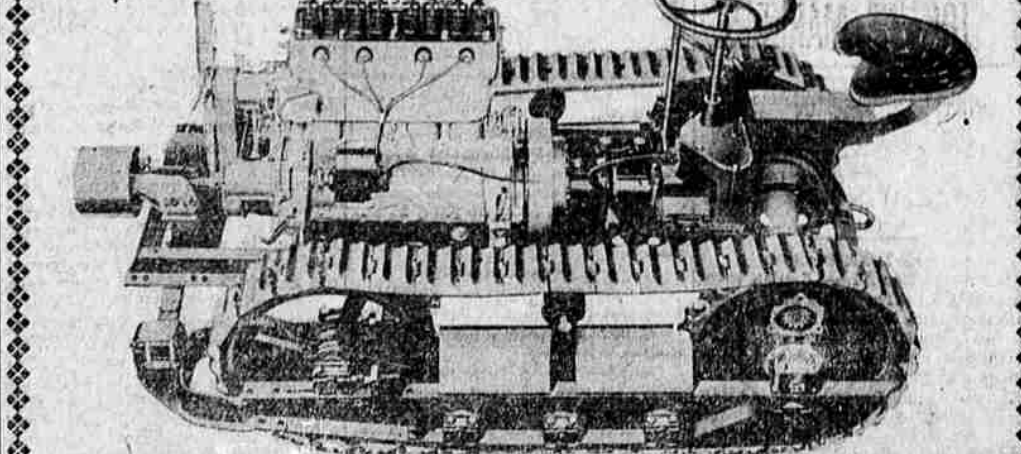
