FLU EPIDEMIC IN MEDFORD IS ABOUT HOLDING ITS OWN

The flu epidemic in Medford today was reported as holding its own. Two deaths were reported. Mrs. J. T. Lee of this city, and Charley Mori, the Japanese janitor at the Jackson County bank, while four more cases were taken to the Sacred Heart hospital, making a total of sixty cases. Five cases were dismissed from the Sacred Heart hospital this morning and most of the cases are reported to be light, with recovery in a few days.

At a special meeting of the city council yesterday two ordinances were passed, one placing influenza in the list of contagious diseases with smallpox, diphtheria, etc., which requires quarantine regulations where-over the health authorities believe necessary.

The other was a revision of the flu mask ordinance correcting certain technical errors in the first draft. As now drawn masks covering the nose and mouth are required by all people in stores, hotel lobbies and places of business as well as on the streets.

Chief of Police Timothy made four arrests this morning of flu mask violators. Those apprehended were L. D. Laughlin, C. S. Webster, R. D. Hensen and S. W. Douglas. All were given the regulation fine of \$5 by Justice Taylor and all fines were paid without complaint.

WHITE PLAGUE NOT A CITY DISEASE

CHICAGO, Dec. 11.—Doubt that tuberculosis is a "city disease" was presented to the American Public Health association, convention here today by Dr. Burton R. Rogers of New York. He said the secretary of the Indiana state board of health had written him that out of a total population of 13,000 in Crawford county, Indiana, 2000 had died of tuberculosis within ten years.

"Can such a record be even paralleled in the worst 'lung block' in the worst city in America?" asked the speaker. "Investigation in other states might reveal even worse conditions."

PARIS, Dec. 12.—The length of President Wilson's "official" visit in Paris has been fixed at 48 hours, according to the Matin. The remainder of his stay here will not be marked by any state ceremony.

ARMY AVIATOR FLEW 6 MILES GALLON OF GAS

MATHER FIELD, Sacramento, Cal., Dec. 12.—A summary of his flight from Mather Field to Seattle and return prepared by Lieutenant A. F. Hogland, army flying officer, and made public today, showed the aviator traveled a total of 1365 miles, and flew on an average of 50 miles an hour. He made the trip on 217 gallons of gasoline, burning one gallon to every 6.3 miles flown. He covered 675 miles in the flight to Seattle and 690 miles in returning.

"I cleared many mountain peaks by less than 100 feet and found it necessary to go around several because I was unable to gain sufficient altitude to cross them directly." Lieutenant Hogland's report said. "Numerous thick clouds encountered over the mountains yesterday made flying very dangerous on the return trip," he added.

OBITUARY

MORI—Charley T. Mori, 36 years old, the first Japanese to come to Medford, died today of influenza. He had been sick two weeks. Mori for 11 years had been janitor at the Jackson County bank and was well and favorably known to a large number of people in the city. He leaves a wife and three children, all of whom are ill with the disease and are in charge of a special nurse. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

ADAMS—Mrs. O. N. Murphy of South Central received word today from Joe Adams of Yreka, of the death of his brother, Mack Adams, formerly of Medford, known as Slim Adams, who for many years was a saloonkeeper in this city. Influenza was the cause of death. The body will be shipped to Medford for burial.

LEE—Alta Pearl, wife of J. T. Lee, of 822 East Ninth street, at Sacred Heart hospital, Dec. 12, from influenza. She lived in Medford since Sept. 12, 1917. She leaves her husband, Jack, and two sons, Floyd and Chas. Woodcock. She was a member of Sweet Home camp No. 3534, Caldwell, Idaho. Funeral arrangements later in charge of the Pocatontos lodge.

NO REDUCTION IN WAGES FOR MANY YEARS SAYS WILSON

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—No reduction in wages can be expected for a number of years because the demand for labor will exceed the country's supply, the house rules committee was told by Secretary of Labor Wilson. He appeared to urge the completion of legislation to provide useful and necessary public work for discharged soldiers and industrial workers.

The secretary thought it would be but a brief period if at all that the government would have to provide employment.

He suggested extensive work on highways, rivers and harbors and public buildings under new appropriation bills being framed by house committees.

J. A. WESTERLUND NOT OPPOSED TO FLU MASK

J. A. Westerlund, who was arrested yesterday for violating the flu mask ordinance abandoned his purpose of contesting the measure and before Justice Taylor Wednesday afternoon pleaded guilty to the charge. Mr. Westerlund explained that he had no intention of opposing the provision in which he firmly believed, but did not want to be made the goat. Since the ordinance was passed he said he had worn a mask and only took it off for a few minutes Wednesday morning while he went from the Holland hotel to the woodpile in the rear. He felt this was only a technical violation and he should not be held up before the public as a law-breaker.

In addressing the court City Attorney Fred Mears supported this view and said the trouble had rested upon a misunderstanding. He expressed confidence in Mr. Westerlund's intention to obey the law, and suggested leniency be shown. Justice Taylor thereupon assessed the regular fine of \$5 which was remitted and the incident considered closed.

Abandon 19 War Projects.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—Abandonment of nine war construction projects, including a number of nitrate and other chemical plants was announced today by the war department.

KEEP MASKS CLEAN SAYS PUBLIC NURSE

The mask may become a source of danger to the individual wearing it unless it is kept clean. If possible have two masks and change several times daily. As soon as a mask is removed from the face after being worn several hours, it should be placed in a pan or kettle with boiling water and allowed to boil several minutes. If one has only one mask this might be done at the noon hour and again

at night. It takes a mask only a few minutes to dry and no ironing is necessary. When a mask is removed for a short time and is again placed on the face without washing, care should be taken to get it on in the same way as before. If the side worn outside before is now placed next to the nose and mouth the germs collected there will be drawn by the breath into the body. Have the children observe this.
