OREGON MEN TO BE DISCHARGED AT CAMP LEWIS

CAMP LEWIS, Tacoma, Wash., Dec. 17.—Only men will be discharged from the army here who reside in the states of Washington, Oregon, Montana, Wyoming, North and South Dakota, Utah, Colorado and California north of Bakersfield; northern Nevada, northern New Mexico, western Nebraska and a very small corner of Texas. A zone outlining the limits was announced today.

Men from other states will be sent in large bodies to the camps nearest their homes.

Brigadier General Cornelius Vandenberg, today was granted leave of 30 days beginning December 21. Major General Joseph D. Leitich, it was announced, would pass the holidays with relatives in Aberdeen, Wash.

An extremely large number of officers are obtaining leaves which will take them away from camp during the next few days. Those forced to remain here for duty will alternate in short leaves during the holidays with other officers similarly placed. In this manner practically every officer in camp will be enabled to pass either Christmas day or New Year's day away from camp.

WILSON LOSES COLD; KEEPING OWN COUNSEL

PARIS, Dec. 17.—While things are shaping for the great gathering, President Wilson is evidently working out his own plans and for the most part keeping his own counsel.

President Wilson's health continues good. He has completely shaken off the cold which followed him to Europe. He is keeping in the closest touch with affairs in the United States thru advices from the White House, from members of the cabinet, and the heads of some of the special war bureaus upon whom he is depending for accurate information.

So far as is known the president has not yet selected a director-general of railroads, and Director General McAdoo may hold over until the president's return.

DISCUSS HOOVER AS LEADER OF ALLIED RELIEF

PARIS, Dec. 17.—Economic questions are coming prominently to the front in the discussions preliminary to the assembling of the inter-allied conference. The main point hinges on the appointment of Herbert C. Hoover as director-general of relief for all the allies and the United States.

An agreement concerning raw materials promises to be the main subject of discussion. A number of other questions also are involved, particularly the use of merchant shipping now in German ports for the distribution of relief and also the prompt movement of American troops back to the United States.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—The resignation of E. P. Bass as director of the marine and dock industrial relations committee of shipping board has been accepted, effective January 1.

Mr. Bass also has resigned as chairman of the national adjustment commission.

PLEAD GUILTY TO CHARTERING SHIP FOR HUNS

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 17.—Pleas of guilty to an alleged conspir-

acy to supply German warships at sea through the wholesale chartering of American and other vessels here, in violation of the neutrality laws, were entered here today by four shipping firms and the chancellor of the former German consulate here. Sentence was set for December 21.

The shipping men were Robert H. Swayne, C. D. Bunker, Thomas W. Anderson and Joseph H. Blev. The firms were C. D. Bunker and company and the Northern and Southern Steamship company. The consular agent was Heinrich Kauffmann.
