

RED SOCIALISTS FAIL IN EFFORT TO GET CONTROL

BERLIN, Monday, Dec. 16.—(By the Associated Press.)—The central congress of delegates of the soldiers' and workmen's councils from many parts of Germany opened today in the building formerly used by the Prussian diet. There were three women among the 450 delegates.

During the organization of the congress it became evident that the independent socialists and the Spartacus group were greatly outnumbered. None of the important posts in congress was given to delegates from Berlin.

The Spartacus group made a futile attempt to intimidate the congress. A resolution was submitted that Karl Liebknecht and Rosa Luxemburg, leaders of the Spartacus group, be invited to attend the congress as guests with advisory powers. Less than 15 per cent of the delegates voted for the resolution.

Later, while Herr Mueller, chairman of the workmen's section of the executive committee, was speaking, the chairman of the congress interrupted to say:

"There is a comrade present who wishes to submit a communication."

The newcomer announced that he represented 250,000 workmen who were then assembled outside the diet building. He read a list of demands identical with the Spartacus program, including retention of all power by the soldiers' and workmen's councils, no national assembly and the formation of a red guard. This aroused a storm of protest and the intruder left the building.

The 250,000 workmen who he said were outside the building proved to be about 7,000 from five factories, whom the Liebknecht agents had induced to go on a strike temporarily. In the meantime, Dr. Liebknecht succeeded in entering the building and made a speech to the crowd from a window.

U.S. CASUALTY LIST NOT YET REPORTED IS OVER 40,000

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—General Pershing said in a recent cable that the number of unreported casualties in process of verification at the central records office of expeditionary forces on December 14, was 40,440. They are divided as follows:

Killed in action, 390; died of wounds, 275; died of disease, 353; accidentally killed, 51; severely wounded in action, 32,371. These included all "suspense cases under investigation," the general said.

Total casualties to November 23, in the 30th (Wild Cat) division, (North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee National Guard) were given as 7,623. The casualties were classified as follows: Killed in action, 1,108; died of wounds, 283; died of disease, 131; died of other causes, five; severely wounded, 1,181; wounded, degree undetermined, 805; slightly wounded, 3,973; missing or captured, 193.

General Pershing reported that the number of duplicated casualties discovered in the central records office since November 27, would not operate to reduce the total for the entire expeditionary forces given in his summary of that date, as additional casualties reported more than offset the duplicates.

WILSON MISSES GOLF COURSE; SEES PALACE

PARIS, Dec. 17.—President Wilson's visit to Versailles today was unannounced and informal. Mr. Wilson's idea was to inspect the golf course, which, on advice of Rear Admiral Grayson, his personal physician, he will probably visit as often as time permits. The driver, who was unacquainted with the route, missed the golf course and Mr. Wilson saw only the palace, returning to Paris in time for luncheon.

Tomorrow night the president will attend a reception to be given by Ambassador Sharp at the American embassy. King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Elena of Italy will be received at the Murat residence, between 5 and 7 o'clock Thursday evening.

Today's reception was the last of the affairs arranged wholly by the French government. Hereafter all Mr. Wilson's movements will be arranged for by his personal staff. His conference with Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain is still indefinite as to time, but it is not probable that it will occur before the end of this week or the beginning of next.

BERLIN SCHOOL PUPILS DEMAND EBERT'S SCALP

BERLIN, Monday, Dec. 16.—(By the Associated Press.)—Several hundred boys and girls paraded through the streets of the city today on their way to the reichstag building, where the soldiers' and workmen's congress is being held. They demanded, among other things, votes for persons 18 years of age, the abolition of corporal punishment in schools and the participation by children in the administration of government and schools. The marchers carried red flags and incendiary placards.

A 17-year-old lad made an address warning the executive committee of "terrible consequences" if the juvenile program was not carried out. The chairman of the executive committee declared his sympathy with the children's demands. Later the procession gathered in the square in front of the reichstag building, where youthful orators demanded the removal of Premier Ebert and Philipp Scheidemann from office, opposing the convening of the national assembly and threatened a juvenile strike throughout Germany if the demands were not immediately accepted.

PORTLAND HERO URGES PEOPLE TO BACK RED CROSS

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 17.—"The Red Cross is on the job, night and day doing wonderful work," states Lieut. Herman L. McLeod, 83rd company, 6th regiment, Marine corps, who wears the gold wound and service stripes, decorated by French and American governments. Lieutenant McLeod, at present visiting in Portland on sick leave, pays the highest compliments to the service the Red Cross has given the American soldiers in the war zone.

Before and after he received two machine gun bullets in the stomach, July 23, at Soissons, the Lieutenant had first hand experience with the Red Cross, which is conducting a drive for membership from December 16 to 23.

"There is a Red Cross unit over there," says Lieutenant McLeod, "which is working independent of army authority. There is no red tape nor awaiting orders. Whenever there is a battle this unit goes to the spot, opens a field hospital of tents, with nurses and doctors, and takes care of the wounded until the regular army nurses arrive. This Red Cross unit is often 36 hours ahead of the army nurses. As soon as the army nurses come up the Red Cross outfit packs up and moves away and heads for the next scene of trouble. It is a real flying squadron.

"It was this Red Cross unit that gave me attention when I was wounded, and I may say that when you are wounded and in a Red Cross hospital no charge whatever is asked for any articles asked for by wounded.

"The Red Cross is the only organization over there which gives you the things you need without charge. When I found myself without tooth brush, toothpaste brush and similar little necessities, the Red Cross supplied me free.

"I give this testimonial to the good

Lieutenant McLeod cannot make a tour of the state during the Red Cross membership drive, much as he desires to do so, because of his wounded condition. The president's approval came in one of a number of executive business dispatches today from Paris.

U. S. NAVY WILL NEED 200,000 MEN IN 1919

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—Two hundred thousand men must be recruited for the navy next year to take the places of men who will be demobilized, Captain H. Laning, chief of the bureau of navigation, made this estimate today in asking the house naval affairs committee for an appropriation of \$12,000,000 to cover transportation and recruiting expenses.

U. S. Fleet Not at Pola.
LONDON, Dec. 17.—The Italian embassy here states that the report from Liabach to the effect that an American squadron had arrived at Pola was unfounded.
