### POULTRY SHOW TO CLOSE TONIGHT AFTER SUCCESSFUL EXHIBIT

That the annual poultry show of the Southern Oregon Poultry association, which closes its doors tonight at 9 o'clock is a very creditable exhibition of standard bred poultry and "is the best county exhibit held in Oregon this season," is the statement of U. L. Unson, poultry specialist for the United States department of agriculture. He is especially well pleased with the display of barred rock, white Wyandotte, Rhode Island Red and S. C. White Leghorn classes, and is of the opinion that some of the individual entries in these classes might well be sent to the Portland show the latter part of this month.

Mr. Unson, who is a practical poultryman and the owner of the largest commercial trap-nested breeding plant in the state, at Grants Pass, has been in attendance upon the show for the past three days for the purpose of assisting the local poultrymen in the formation of a county poultry committee to work with County Agent Cate in furthering the poultry industry in Jackson county. This work is in line with the purpose of

the department of agriculture to organize a poultry committee in each county of the state in which poultry constitutes an important feature of agricultural work. These committees will carry on an educational campaign among the poultry producers of the county for the purpose of improving methods and increasing the profits to be derived from poultry raising.
