SALEM TO CURB STATE LEGISLATORS

The city council of Salem, acting on the board of health of the state capital, has passed a drastic order, prohibiting loafing and loitering, the entering of public places and stores, excepting strictly for business purposes, and putting a ban on public funerals and special store sales. In the event the legislature fails to make any proper rule regarding the state house lobbies and crowds, the city authorities according to Mayor C. E. Albin, will go to the limit to curb them. "The situation here is serious, and those who are attempting to make light of it do not realize just how serious it is," said the mayor. "In some homes as high as 12 people are flat on their backs with absolutely no assistance given them save that of a volunteer nurse, who travels from place to place and gives what aid she can in one visit a day."

The Lapland, due January 19, is bringing casual companies mainly composed of men from the southern states. The Cretie is due January 20 with 42nd regiment coast artillery complete, 16 casual officers and about 250 other casuals and sick and wounded.
