SURPLUS OF LABOR IN TWELVE STATES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—Calling attention to an increase in unemployment of common labor, a message today from the National Council of Defense says the secretary of labor urges all state, county and community councils to bend every effort toward finding or creating necessary employment, saying it is possible the danger point will be reached within 30 days.

Whereas there was unemployment in seven states a week ago, the message says, this condition now prevails in 12—California, Colorado, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oregon and Utah.

RADICALS FAIL TO WIN MOONEY MEETING

CHICAGO, Jan. 14.—An attempt of radicals, including socialists and I. W. W., to capture the labor meeting in behalf of T. J. Mooney of California, resulted in much disorder, but no real violence, this afternoon. After much noise and confusion credentials were refused to those who came as socialists or members of the I. W. W. Credentials were restricted to representatives of trades unions who came by invitation.

At the height of the trouble speakers were on their feet all over the hall, surging up the aisles, tumbling over chairs or mounting them, demanding to be heard.

CRUISER ARRIVES WITH 1700 TROOPS

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—The United States cruiser Huntington arrived here today from Brest with 44 officers and 1700 men from the American expeditionary forces. The troops included the headquarters company of the 29th coast artillery brigade and the 57th coast artillery regiment complete. Eight men of the navy personnel also were passengers.

BOLSHEVIK FORCES ATTACKING WARSAW

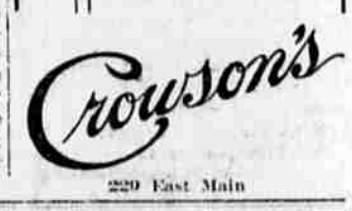
WARSAW, Jan. 12.—(City Associated Press.) Bolshevist forces are converging on Warsaw over three lines of railroad. The number of the enemy is unknown. It is estimated, however, that the Bolshevists have thirty thousand men. It is feared that Warsaw is in danger of meeting the fate of Vilna.

URUGUAY ARRESTS BOLSHEVIK AGITATORS

MONTEVIDEO, Jan. 14.—The Uruguayan government has discharged all foreigners from the army as a preventive measure against the Maximalist movement. The police announce that the entire 43 members of the "center of culture" which has been directing the soviet movement have been arrested.
