Ordinance No. 065

AN ORDINANCE authorizing and providing for the issue and sale of Refunding Improvement Bonds, issue of 1919, of the City of Medford, Oregon.
WHEREAS, the amount of the outstanding and unpaid City of Medford Improvement Bonds and warrants for paving, sewers and water-mains and a part of the amount of the coupons of such bonds held by the City and representing moneys advanced by it from taxes and otherwise to meet from time to time maturing interest payments in the Bond Fund Districts heretofore consolidated, is the sum of \$700,000.00, and it is necessary to issue bonds of the City of Medford to the amount of \$700,000.00, for the purpose of providing for the said bonds, warrants and a part of the amount of said coupons;
Now, Therefore,
THE CITY OF MEDFORD DOETH ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:
Section 1. Under and pursuant to the provisions of the charter of the City of Medford, Refunding Improvement Bonds of the City of Medford in the amount sufficient to pay and redeem the indebtedness hereinbefore

pay interest or principal as the same matures, the full faith, credit and resources of said city are hereby pledged to provide for the prompt payment thereof.
And it is hereby certified that every requirement of law relating to the issue hereof has been duly complied with and that this bond is with every debt and other limit prescribed by the constitution or laws of the State of Oregon, including the charter of said City.
IN WITNESS WHEREOF, said The City of Medford, has caused this bond to be signed by its Mayor, countersigned by its Treasurer, attested by its Recorder and authenticated by the seal of the said City, and has caused the interest coupons hereon attached to bear the facsimile signature of said Mayor and City Recorder, and this bond to be dated the first day of January, A. D. 1919.

Section 1. The full faith, credit and resources of the City of Medford, are hereby pledged to each successive holder of each of said bonds for the punctual payment of the principal and interest thereof, when and as the same shall become due and the said City hereby covenants and agrees with each successive holder of each of said bonds and coupons that there will be applied as collected in the payment of the said bonds, all outstanding and unpaid assessments appearing upon the said Consolidated Lien Docket, and also that there shall be levied and collected in each year on all the taxable property in said City, an annual tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds as such interest shall mature and also pay the principal thereof at maturity.
