THE WAY OF THE FLIP-FLOP.

RECENTLY the Portland Oregonian surprised its readers by dropping petty partisanship for patriotism. It commended the president's visit to France as necessary and advocated the proposed league of nations as the realization of the ideals fought for by the Yanks in France.

The patriotic impulse was short-lived, however. Within a month, the Oregonian was back in the old rut, abusing the president for everything under the sun and giving him no credit for anything.

The sudden reversal of the Oregonian's attitude from lofty patriotism to petty partisanship was not due, as the newspaper alleges, to the realization that congress is composed of dubs and incapable of functioning save for partisanship, and that the nation is helplessly adrift and nearing the rocks of disaster.

While the editor was kotowing to majesty, which gracefully permitted him to bask in the shining light of the royal presence, hobnobbing with near nobility, and telling Foch how to win the war, the Oregonian went far astray, laid aside its bias, took a broad view of events and gave the president fair treatment.

One can imagine the editor's chagrin upon his return. During his brief absence the Oregonian had "gone to hell." Here was the pet bone-head partisan organ of the west failing to stand hitched, showing a gleam of reason and a streak of liberalism.

ELIMINATION OF POLITICS URGED IN RAIL CONTROL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—Elimination of political influences, which he said had "inevitably been injected into consideration" of railroad regulation by a commission, was urged by A. P. Thom, counsel for the Association of Railway Executives today in continuing his argument for the establishment of a department of transportation before the senate interstate commerce committee.

OUTLINE PROGRAM FOR AIDING MOONEY

CHICAGO, Jan. 17.—The resolutions committee of the International Workers Defense League reported a program in behalf of Thomas J. Mooney today. The committee recommended that a committee of five be sent to Washington to demand federal intervention to free Mooney from prison; a campaign of publicity, and these measures failing, to call a general strike July 4, first, however, submitting the strike call to a referendum vote of workers.

REFUSES MILLION FOR CHURCH YARD

FORT WORTH, Tex., Jan. 17.—The Merriman Baptist Church of Ranger which already has acquired an income of \$200,000 a year thru oil wells sunk in its church yard, has refused one million dollars for the right to develop wells in the graveyard which adjoins the church, it became known here today.

PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION FOR BRAZIL IN 30 DAYS

BIO JANEIRO, Thursday, Jan. 16.—Nilo Pebarina, foreign minister; Altino Arantes and Arthur Bernardes will be candidates for the presidency at the special elections to be held within 30 days as a result of the death of President-elect Alves.

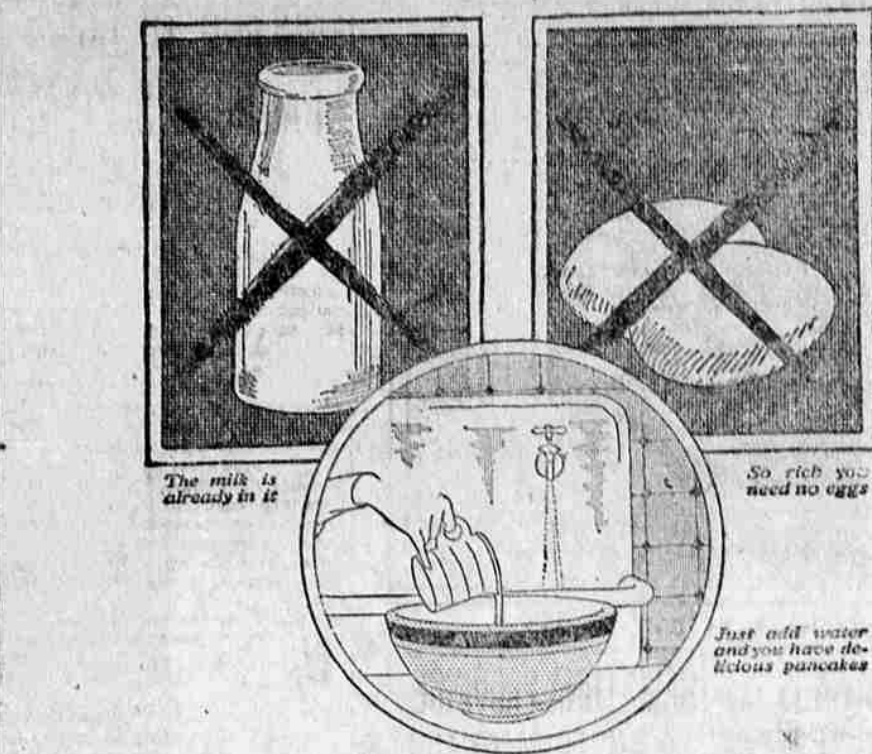
