

BOND ISSUE FOR TEN MILLIONS FOR ROAD BUILDING

SALEM, Jan. 17.—At its initial meeting the senate committee on roads and highways tentatively approved the following program: A bill providing for a \$10,000,000 bond issue, the money not to be limited to paving alone, but to be used to build roads.

Double all automobile license taxes. A tax of one cent a gallon on gasoline and distillate.

Prohibit the payment of royalties on any pavement laid.

Bids for paving to be accepted only on plans and specifications prepared by the state highway department.

Pacific highway from the northern to the southern boundaries of the state and east and west highway from Portland to the Idaho line at Ontario to be built first, secondary trunk lines next, and feeder roads third.

Approximately 75 per cent of the \$10,000,000 to be spent on two main trunk lines and 25 per cent to be left to the discretion of the highway commission expenditure in other counties.

Every member of the committee is a good road booster, and the only dissenting vote cast on the motion to approve a \$10,000,000 bond bill came from Senator L. S. Smith of Coos county, who thought that \$5,000,000 was enough and if more is provided that the large amount will breed extravagance and the highway commission will be unable to judiciously expend it in two years.

ASHLAND AND VICINITY

ASHLAND, Jan. 17.—All local banks make a gratifying showing while entering upon the threshold of business activity for 1919, which promises to be greater in volume than ever before.
